After an illness covering a period of four months, Mr. Robert Hill, of Glen Williams, passed away Tuesday, Mar. 20th, in Guelph General Hospital. Mr. Hill, who was born 78 years ago in Ogdensburg, N.Y., came to Canada with his parents when a child. Mr. Hill is survived by his widow, formerly Elizabeth Duff, daughter of the late James Duff, near Milton; also four sons and four daughters. The funeral, which took place on Thursday afternoon, was conducted by the Rev. D.D. Davidson of Knox Church, Georgetown, interment taking place in Glen Williams cemetery.—Georgetown Herald.

A. S. WILLMOTT

A. S. Willmott, a resident of Milton for the past twenty years, and a lifelong resident of Trafalgar township, died here on Friday, April 5th, in his 73rd year. He was born on the old Willmott homestead, near Milton, where his parents settled at an early age. Deceased was a member of the official board of St. Paul's United Church, a past master of the local Masonic Lodge, a member of the local curling, bowling and golf clubs. Surviving deceased are one sister, Mrs. S. W. Taylor, of Milton, and three brothers, F. C. and John S., both of Milton, and Dr. Robert Willmott, of Stratford. The funeral took place on Monday from his late residence. The services at the house at 4 grave were conducted by Rev. Gordon Porter. Interment was made in Evergreen Cemetery, with Masonic honors.

JAMES G. FORD

James G. Ford, beloved husband of Margaret J. Ford, passed away at his late residence, lot three, first line, Trafalgar, on April 3rd, after a short illness. He was in his 81st year. He was born and lived on the farm all his life, with the exception of six or seven years which he spent with his daughter in Burlington. Deceased was an elder in Omagh Presbyterian Church for many years prior to union. He then became identified with St. Paul's Church, Milton. His declining years was a hindrance to his attendance at Divine worship. Surviving are his wife, and son Clare, of Trafalgar. Service was conducted by Rev. Gordon Porter, assisted by Rev. B.F. Andrew Interment in Omagh Presbyterian Cemetery. The pallbearers were: Geo. Douglas, R. A. Jarvis, Walter Dennis, Jas. Marshall, Wm. Stout, Gordon Tasker. The funeral was largely attended by friends and neighbors.

MRS. ROBERT S. HATELY

Mrs. Robert Hately (Jessie Read) died last night in Toronto Western Hospital after a short illness. She was 35 years of age, and for the past six years had conducted the Telegram's popular food column, "Three Meals a Day."

Even before her newspaper work had gained her a wider following, Jessie Read was one of Canada's best known dietitians. For some time before she joined the Telegram, she was organizer and director of the Home Service Department of the Consumer's Gas Company, and under her guidance the department grew to a thriving organization through which thousands of women every year attended cooking classes. She previously had been associated with a well known Bloor street restaurant, the Diet Kitchen.

Mrs. Hately's work was her hobby, but she was, as well, deeply interested in music. She had been a member of the choir at the Church of the Epiphany, where her husband was at one time organist, and she had sung in the Conservatory Choir and in several of Toronto's operatic productions; she was formerly a member of the Women's Musical Club, and was an energetic singer in the Junior Symphony Association.

She was born in Lucan, but had lived most of her life in Toronto. Here she attended Fern avenue public school and Parkdale College, and received her dietitian's training at the Central Technical School and at the Victoria Memorial Hospital in Montreal.

In 1933 she married Robert Hately. Their daughter, Heather Ann, will be three years old in July.

Mrs. Hately also is survived by her mother, Mrs. William Read; three sisters, Miss Eva Carter, Miss Mary Carter, Mrs. T. D. Kelly, of Talara, Peru, and two brothers, Charles Read and W. A. Carter.

Campbellville Women's Institute

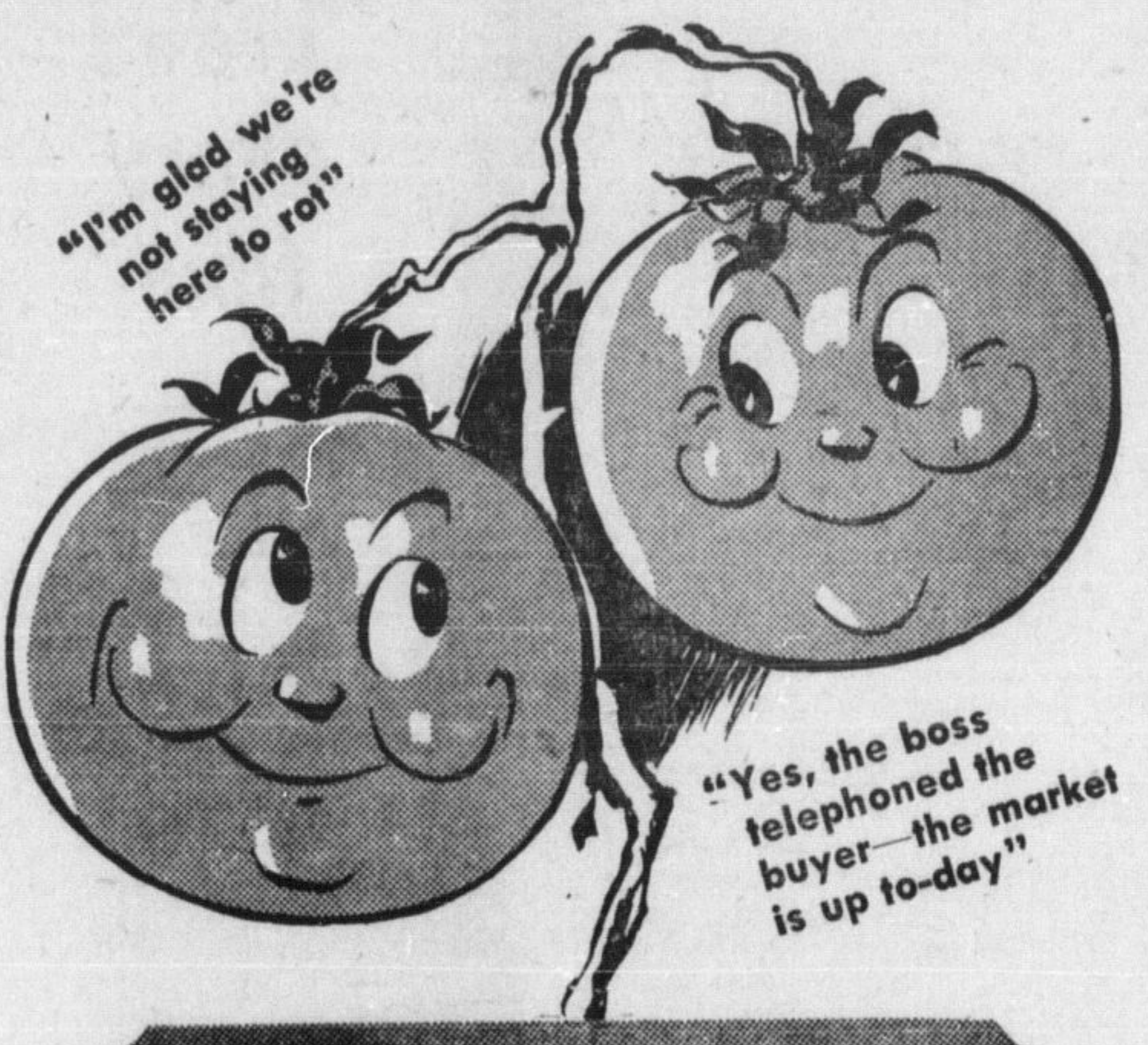
