
# The SNAPSHOT GUILD "FRAMING" YOUR PICTURES



A natural frame adds interest to your pictures. Note how the archway in this shot focuses attention on the mission building.

LIND a natural "frame" for your picture subjects-and as a rule. you'll get pictures that are more in- suitable framing device at hand teresting. This is especially true when the subject is a landscape, a scenic view, a building, a street scene, or similar material with quite a bit of detail.



### Children's Aid Society

Superintendent's Report

Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen: Another year has passed away and again it is my pleasure and duty to submit a report covering the activities of the society during the year ending March 31st, 1940. This is my eleventh report since taking over the work and, I believe, the twenty-sixth annual meeting since Children's Aid societies were formed in the two counties of Peel and Halton.

We little thought a year ago that our country was shortly to be at war, and one wonders what future changes may develop in our economic and social standards. Very shortly after the outbreak of war, the Canadian Welfare Council consulted with the Department of National Defence with reference to investigations and gen eral welfare services for dependants of enlisted men. As a result, all Children's Aid societies throughout the province have been requested by the council to render all possible service in this regard. Services are likely to be of two kinds; poorly adjusted dependants' families, and investigations of certain cases for dependants' al lowance. It is indeed gratifying to know that the federal authorities have recognized the Children's Aid to such an extent as to accept their services in a state of emergency.

It is most difficult year by year to present a report without some simi-While there are new cases being constantly referred to us, there is a sameness in the problems encountered. I will, therefore, endeavor to submit, as briefly as possible, a resume of the year's work.

As many of you are aware, the work of the society is divided under three headings: Children's Protection Act Children of Unmarried Parents Act and the Adoption Act. Those acts are all provincial legislation under the able guidance of B. W. Heise, Provincial superintendent. We also have contact in different cases with the Mothers' Allowances Commission, the Workmen's Compensation Board, Relief Department, and various other agencies throughout the province and in the United States. The spirit of co-operation and good-will that exists at all times between the agencies is most gratifying, all interested in a common cause—the care of helpless children.



### New Scientific Device

Records Heat of Sun Dr. John D. Strong, California Institute of Technology physicist, has utilized a newly invented optical pyrometer to record accurately the temperature on the face of the sun. According to him that temperature is approximately 12,300 degrees Fahrenheit.

The pyrometer, Dr. Strong explained, measures the heat thrown off from the sun by recording the intensity of its light waves. Heretofore this was impossible until the physicist introduced the principle of the infra-red ray in his pyrometer. With the aid of these invisible rays, it is possible to gauge accurately the intensity of the light rays given off by the sun.

"Once we have captured the intensity of light of the sun's rays it is quite simple to measure-by comparing with previously proved formulas-the degree of heat existing at its source," Dr. Strong said.

The optical pyrometer used in the experiments is similar to that used to measure the heat of molten steel. In the steel industry the variously colored heat waves record the temperature of the molten steel when viewed with an optical pyrometer. Dr. Strong made his measurements of the sun's heat by gauging the intensity of infra-red rays emitting from the sun.

Dr. Strong found several other interesting facts concerning ozone heat that are much closer to home.

Experiments with the new pyrometer revealed that the official weather bureau temperature is not universal throughout the area in which the temperature is taken.

For instance, the physicist found that when the official Fahrenheit reading was 72.5 degrees, it was 87.8 degrees on the ground, 89.6 degrees on the surface of oak trees and 97.2 degrees on the south walls of build-




