Miss Bingham had prepared for dinner, according to Donald Houston, who occupied a part of the same house, and had then moved about the suite of rooms she occupied for some time. Houston's attention was drawn by the sound of heavy breathing and he found Miss Bingham in an unconscious condition. Dr. C. V. Williams was called and Miss Bingham was rushed to the Guelph hospital, but the effort to save her life was unsuccessful. Dr. Williams could not immediately identify the substance the unfortunate woman had taken. Miss Bingham had been a resident of Georgetown for some years and was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Bingham, of Erie. She had attended St. George's Church of England.

## Guelph Woman Seriously Injured

There was a car crash north of Campbellville on Friday last, and Mrs. William R. Wheeler, Queen street, west, Guelph, was treated by Dr. R. Jackson, of Rockwood, for a fractured leg, lacerations, bruises and shock, and rushed to Guelph General hospital. Mrs. Wheeler was a passenger in a car driven by her son, Harold Wheeler, Guelph, who escaped serious injury. The collision was in fact at the intersection of the Guelph road and the 12th concession with a car driven by Ephraim Allman, 54, Keele street, Toronto, who was unharmed. At 11:45 a.m. on Friday, a car was attended for possible fractured ribs and many bruises. He was a passenger in the Allman car. Provincial Constables A. J. Oliver and George Cookman, of Milton, investigated.

## Tree Breaks Fall Of Car, Saves Two

Glen Williams, May 13 — A large tree 40 feet high, which had been struck on the north line, Esqueping township, stopped the drop of a car in which two Esqueping township residents were trapped. The men, Oscar Jacobs and J. J. Brown, escaped injuries while a passenger, Edward Martin, 38, is in Guelph General Hospital suffering from a possible fracture of the skull, police stated. The tree stood at the top of the embankment and was taking roots and barb wire fences with it as it somersaulted down the steep bank, police added. Dr. R. T. Paul, of Georgetown, treated Martin. Provincial Constable A. J. Oliver, of Milton, is investigating.

## Halton Hollander Blames Fifth Column

"The successful conquest of Holland by the Germans is not due to the efforts of the invading hordes, but to the organized 'fifth column' activity throughout the country," said Lykie DeVries, Dutch farmer, north of here. Prominent in the community, and on the executives of many of Halton's agricultural organizations, he is today fearful for the safety of his mother, father, two brothers and other near relatives in east Holland. Formerly a second owner in the Dutch navy, Mr. DeVries is a native of The Hague, and came to Canada 14 years ago. He blames a vast and efficient spy ring for the firing of Dutch cities and the victory of the enemy.

## Barbers Held Conference

A conference of all persons engaged in the barbering trade in the district, including Acton, Milton and Georgetown, was convened in Georgetown last Wednesday by an officer representing the Industrial and Labor Board, under the authority of the Department of Labor. In the near future, all barbers in the zone designated by this Board, will be operating under the Industrial Standards Act, an act framed for the purpose of better working conditions for both employer and employee. Standard prices and wages will be enforced by the Department of Labor.—Georgetown Herald.
