Nassagaweya School Area Present Joint School Demonstration

The Modern School in Action

The schools of the Nassagaweya school area presented at Brookville hall on Thursday, May 30, a most unique demonstration of typical school activities under the present program of studies. Work of all subjects was carried out by the pupils of the seven schools, largely without teacher assistance. The modern-day trends in the teaching of English were splendidly shown by choral speaking demonstrations by the pupils of S.S. No. 1 and S.S. No. 7. In each case the teachers coordinated the work of the pupils to the values obtained by this type of school work. The voice control shown by these demonstrations is very worth while. An impromptu conversation by the pupils of S.S. No. 10 showed a use of the many ways in which the schools are endeavoring to prepare pupils to think and speak clearly on the public platform. A correlation of English and health was shown by the pupils of S.S. No. 4, showing the importance of proper care of the teeth and the prevention of germ action.

The pupils of S.S. No. 1 demonstrated the method dealing with a social studies topic by individual silent reading, group discussion around a table, and the making of a large wall picture or mural to represent the information obtained. Mrs. V. Y. took part in a brief silent reading period concerning Captain Cook. After this the teacher and all pupils entered freely into a group discussion of the information gathered from several books. The pupils then took turns in explaining how the mural, which they had previously planned and made as a group, expressed their ideas through art.

Music played an important part in the program. A massed choir composed of the pupils of S.S. Nos. 2, 3 and 4, and a singing class by S.S. No. 10, presented a number of songs. Science showed the result of the increased emphasis being placed upon music in our schools now. Mrs. Robertson, one of three music supervisors in the seven schools, gathered the pupils of all schools combined to sing an appropriate farewell song composed as a school exercise by the pupils of S.S. No. 4 and set to the tune of "Goodnight Ladies."

As a setting for these demonstrations the hall was fittingly decorated with murals, projects, written samples, art sequences, and many other types of pupil work. Parents were thus able to see the results of many features of present educational trends.

The inspector of public schools, Mr. J. A. Partridge, pointed out some of the wide implications of pupil development provided by our present school activities and how such a demonstration had been made possible by the co-operative union of the seven schools under one board through the organization of the township school activities and the amount of instructional equipment which has been added to the schools during the last six months has also assisted greatly in enabling these schools to adopt progressive educational methods.
