P. S. Inspector's Report

Mr. E. E. Yates, Sec.-Treas., Board of Public School Trustees, Milton, Ont.
Dear Sir and Members of the Board:
In his report last spring I believe that Mr. Skuce mentioned the revised policy of making but one report per year. I have pleasure in following up that policy and hereby make my report for the school year.
The function of the modern school is to provide a suitable environment in order that pupils from year to year make a natural growth in the development of desirable types of personality, in the understanding of the worth while features of human heritage and relationship, and in skills useful in daily life. This environment is provided by the co-operation of the board, the principals, and the teachers. It consists of such conditions, suitable books and educational equipment and supplies, and the personal inspiration and leadership of the teachers. When our schools have adequately met these conditions and our pupils live normal, happy lives, suitable to their present ages and grades, they will year by year grow into the type of citizen which we wish to see in the next generation, providing with an adequate body of information, grounded in skills useful in Art, Writing, and manual work, and with a deep sense of appreciation of beauty and harmony in Music, Nature, Literature and Art. It is from these broader points of view that I have tried to understand and, where possible, to assist in the tasks of your teachers.
I have not followed the policy of making one official visit to your school, but rather one of dropping in for various lengths of time at various times during the year, in an effort to get some understanding of routine school work without adding unnecessary strain which is more likely to occur with a more lengthy visit. It is the main spirit of life and progress in each classroom that really counts rather than the individual formal lesson period or isolated facts of subjects.
On one occasion my many brief calls it has been a pleasure and an inspiration to see the family-like spirit of comradeship and co-operation that exists among the members of staff. This is due in no small measure to the genial, friendly, and business-like manner of your principal, Mr. Foster. You are fortunate in having as head of your school a man whose combined such a keen insight into human nature with a thorough knowledge of the principles and practices of teaching and of administering a school. I have been well pleased with the academic progress of his Grade VIII pupils and feel that their record this June should follow the high standard set by his class last year. Even more important than this academic knowledge is the training for life that his pupils, and those of the school in general, are obtaining under his leadership.
The staff which you have given Mr. Foster are all hard-working, conscientious and competent teachers. The high standard in Mr. Foster's room is partly assisted by the efficient work of Mr. McCallum and Mr. Fraser. It has been a source of satisfaction to observe the generally fine type of training given by these men, both academically and in personality traits.
