BURGLAR GETS 5 YEARS

The burglar who was captured in Acton last Wednesday night by Stan Anderson, of Hornby, was one of the most criminal, with a lengthy record, and a whole string of aliases. Yesterday (June 26th) he came up for trial in Milton before Magistrate Woodliffe and was sentenced to five years in Kingston Penitentiary. On Saturday, Toronto police identified a watch and chain found on him as property stolen in Toronto. He will go to the city before serving his sentence for trial on charges there. James Thompson was only one of the names he assumed. He was known on police records as James Coulter, James Farrell, James Leary and used the name of Wilson too. He had been out of jail just 42 days, after completing a sentence of ten years in penitentiary. His total prison record is 25 years and 6 months. Chief K. Hartop was in Milton yesterday in connection with the trial. Thompson pleaded guilty to the charge preferred against him. The bench congratulated Miss Grace Gibson, of Acton, and Stanley Anderson, of Hornby, for their courage and intelligence in what the Magistrate termed apprehension of a dangerous criminal.—Acton Free Press.
