The Blanket appeal for the French Red Cross, issued before the capitulation of France, has had a most generous response. From Ontario 42,985 blankets were donated, as well as \$7,503.83 in cash contributions for the purchase of blankets. Due to French armistice the first shipment of 10,000 blankets was sent immediately to the British Red Cross. A message received from them conveyed their most grateful thanks. 13,000 blankets have been sent to the Canadian Red Cross warehouses where they will be at the disposal of the British Red Cross. The remainder are being held in Canada at the request of the Overseas Commissioner, for war contingencies, either in England or in Canada.
