According to the paper, a .2-gram injection of the drug, given intravenously just before a malaria chill, will nearly always bring within 6 to 12 hours a rest period from the fever, lasting from 24 to 48 hours.

"After the interruption the chills and rise of fever return at the same intervals in which they were occurring before the injections," accord ing to the report of the experiments "Usually the interval is sufficient to allow the patient to resume the cy cle and continue until he has had the number of chills considered neces sary for treatment of syphilis.



It is also reported that before any license you is granted applicants will have to show heir Dominion registration card.

In addition, it was pointe out that new models of cars and trucks were now on the market and immed ate delivery could be made of the nev equipment if 1941 plates were releas

ONE way to cut the cost of heat-ing your home is to avoid "Ashpit Waste". By that I mean the amount of coal shaken through the grate before it has been completely burned. Here are a few precautions which will help you to cut down this waste:

1. Burn coal of the proper size. Every heater is designed to burn a particular size. Your dealer can help you decide this. 2. Shake the grates gentlyand only when necessary to make

room for fresh fuel. 3. Keep the ashpit clean and clear of ashes. This is most important . . . because the ashpit serves as a chamber from which air is supplied to the fire. Without an ample supply of air, complete combustion of the coal is

4. Use a high quality Pennsylvania hard coal.



Insulation Patriarch

The oldest form of modern mass insulation is mineral wool, which is exactly 100 years old, having been first made in Wales, England, in 1840. Some of the first railroad cars used it-the crack Twentieth Century Limited uses it today. The Scientific American saw the great value of it in 1887 and accurately predicted that insulation would one day be considered a necessity in a correctly built house. In 1937 the largest apartment development in the world-Parkchester in New York city-adopted mineral wool as an insulation for exterior brick walls, establishing a new use based on a calculated fuel saving of \$40,000 a year. Enough mineral wool is used


