CELEBRATED 90th BIRTHDAY

James Mockridge, Milton's oldest resident, celebrated his 90th birthday at his home here last Monday, November 11th. Born in Bradford in 1857, Mr. Mockridge is one of a family of seven, whose father, Rev. James Mockridge, was rector of Warwick, one of the clergy reserves in Canada. As a young man he worked for the old Grand Trunk, later joining the staff of the Bank of Toronto in 1871. Continuing his duties with the bank in Barrie, Gannock, Thornberry, Rockwood and Toronto, he retired in 1915, then moving to Milton, where he has resided ever since.
In his early life he was a keen golf enthusiast and while in Collingwood assisted in organizing the Collingwood Golf Club.
Mr. Mockridge married Anne Irwin, of Barrie, who died in 1926. There was one daughter, Helen, now living with her father.
Always interested in church work, he is a member of Grace Anglican church and for many years he was auditor of the town of Milton.
