Defence Levy Based

Wage earners get a break this year in their national defence tax that will that of 1911. not be repeated. They will pay national defence tax on only one-half their 1940 income. The national defence tax is considered the first bracket of the income tax, inasmuch as this ta is part of the income tax law. national defence tax for 1940 is only applicable in respect to one-half the total income for the whole of the calendar year, but commencing with and in 1939 it was still far above January 1st, 1941, will be applicable the 1911 level, at 10.3. to the income for the whole of the year

It should be noted, however, that while the provisions of the law in respect to national defence tax did not come into effect until approximately July 1, nevertheless, the tax applied to one-half of the income of the year 1940. irrespective of when earned.

For example: If a single person earned \$1000 between Jan. 1, 1940, and June 30, 1940, and had no income aft er July 1, nevertheless the national defence tax would apply on one-half of the income so earned.

Even if a wage earner was discharg ed June 30th and earned nothing the last half of 1940, he is still liable for tax on one-half his earned income, and should make a return before April 30, 1941. Conversely, if he was unemployed the first half of 1940 he still pays tax on one-half the total income earned in 1940, and if his employer deducted the full amount, he is entitled to apply to the income tax branch for readjust-

straight 2 per cent., less deductions for dependants, an unmarried man pays two per cent, tax if his total income was less than \$1200 and three per cent, if more than \$1200. an unmarried man earning \$1500 in 1940 will pay \$22.50 national defence tax, which is three per cent. on onehalf the salary he earned in 1940. He will pay \$45 national defence tax on his 1941 income.

A deduction of \$8 a year from the tax is allowed for each dependent. grandchild, brother or sister under 21 years of age, and for each child, grand child, brother or sister 21 years or over, and parents or grandparents of the taxpayer, wholly dependant because of physical or mental infirmity. Since the 1940 tax is collected on only onehalf the 1940 salary, the deduction of this year is only \$4.

Automobile Highway May Cross Panama Isthmus

The motor highway across the Isthmus of Panama, which has been talked of so long, may soon become a reality, according to Douglas Malcolm of the American Express.

This new highway, which will link the Atlantic with the Pacific, will be the world's shortest transcontinental highway, as its length from ocean to ocean will be only a little over 50 miles. It will cross the continental divide at an elevation of little over 300 feet. 
