

COUNTY COUNCIL

The second meeting of the 1941 county council was held in Milton Tuesday, with all members present and the Warden, Leslie Kerns, in the chair.

At the afternoon session a letter was read from John Byers, ex-reverend of Oakville, tendering his resignation as a member of the Good Roads Committee.

It was moved by Mr. Gilbert, seconded by Mr. Campbell, that Mr. Finney be appointed to the Good Roads Committee for five years.

Before the motion could be put before the council, Mr. Harold Cleave, reeve of Georgetown, rose to his feet and said: "Mr. Warden, I would like to voice my objection to this appointment. I have nothing whatever against Mr. Finney, but I think for the time he has served in the County Council he has been very well treated."

Mr. Hillier: Perhaps I might say that neither Mr. Campbell nor myself has any wish to serve in that committee, as neither of us feel that we would have the time to give to it at present.

Mr. Cleave: I must say that when the striking committee came back with their report at the last meeting I was frankly speaking, disappointed.

Mr. Finney: I have always tried to do my best in every way, and as regards the road committee I think it only fair that preference should be given to the Reeves of the four townships as they naturally represent a greater percentage of mileage in the county.

Mr. Campbell: Perhaps I should explain to the council that I was offered the position of chairman of the Finance Committee, but declined.

Mr. Hillier: I appreciate that explanation. (Mr. Finney was appointed chairman of the Finance.)

Mr. Hall: I am in favor of the four townships being given the preference.

Mr. Chalmers: I am in favor of that too, but I think the extra man should be moved around.

Mr. Dick: I think we should call in the matter for us in about two minutes.

At this point Mr. Gilbert said: "Here comes the very gentleman who can give us the information we want—Mr. P. M. Higgins from the Provincial Department of Highways and R. M. Smith, county engineer."

The problem of the Road Committee was explained to Mr. Higgins, who gave his opinion as follows: If the Warden is already a member of the committee and resigns that office he resigns as a member of the committee except in his capacity as Warden. And that does not mean, continued Mr. Hillier, "that we want Mr. Kerns out or anyone else for that matter, but we do want this thing settled the right way."
