**BEAR TAKES UP HIS HOME IN TREE NEAR MILTON**  
While in the bush on the farm of E. Ford, Trafalgar, on Tuesday morning Ernest Timbers, Milton, spied a two-year-old black bear near the top of a large tree. When he was about 50 feet away he thought it was a raccoon and went to get it. When he was within a few feet of the tree the bear started to climb down. As he had nothing to protect himself with he grabbed for a stick which he threw, hitting the tree. The bear clambered up again and into a hole in the tree. He then went to a near by farmer, George McGavin, and reported the bear to the police. McGavin and Timbers went back to the tree armed with two guns to get the animal. Timbers fired a gun through the tree as his friends stood back about 15 feet, expecting the bear to come out of the opening near the top. Only the one shot was fired, and it was lucky. Timbers said. He heard the bear fall. When they cut a hole at the base of the tree to extricate the animal it was noticed he had been there for some time. It is believed to be the only bear shot in Halton county in 40 years.
