**TOWN COUNCIL**

Interest in the discussion of purchasing a utility truck and the hiring of a town foreman was shown by all the members of the council at their regular meeting held Tuesday night.

Mayor Armstrong—"I would like to know where this money is coming from. Is it included in the estimates?"

Reeve Heslop—"Some of it is from the waterworks and some from the streets and walks."

Mr. Ptolemy—"And Town Hall?"

Mr. Davidson—"It was going to get a working foreman and he will look after the arena, I am in favor of it."

Mayor Armstrong—"Then it means this expense will come out of all the different departments of the town."

The motion to hire the foreman was carried unanimously and applications will be received, to be considered at a special meeting next Tuesday.

The council then agreed to purchase a 2 to 1 ton truck from Johnson's Garage, after tenders had been considered.

A communication was received from the board of Trade Commissioners outlining the hazard of a hedge north of the C.P.R. tracks on Martin Street. They recommended the town request to have this hedge trimmed.

Clerk J. W. Blain reported that the Public School Board had turned down the council's recommendation to dismiss the pupils fifteen minutes earlier as a safety guard during the noon-hour traffic rush on Main St. The board regretted the board did not see fit to co-operate with the town in the matter.

Several requests were made by citizens for the use of town lots for garden purposes.

Gordon Kzard interviewed council for the purpose of buying certain property belonging to the town.

Accounts totalling \$3497.95 were passed.

**War Services Campaign News**

The Campaign throughout the Dominion has been a success and will go over the objective, which shows that the people of Canada are backing their fighting boys to the limit.

**TRAGIC STORY FROM THE ROADS**

A high expert of traffic problems predicts that automobile fatalities this year will be higher than ever before. Fatalities in January and February were twenty-two per cent. ahead of previous figures in the United States.

The Canadian people had hoped that most automobile drivers were learning sense. Motor vehicle authorities and safety officials are doing their best to reduce accidents, but if many people will drive at top speed, tragedies will occur. It may be that improving business has a tendency to increase accidents, since people have more money to spend, and they travel more on business and pleasure, and traffic density increases. It would be a sad anti-climax, if the best business year since 1929 should see the saddest record of death on the road.
