Margaret Jane Garbutt

Margaret Jane Garbutt died at her home on the town line, Trafalgar township, in her 85th year, on Tuesday morning, May 6th, 1941, after a long illness. She was predeceased by her husband, Robert Garbutt, 31 years ago and was the daughter of the late James Ford, Nelson township. She is survived by two sons, Gerald and Hamilton, who are at home, and one sister, Mrs. Mattie Gillett, 1111 Main Street. She was a member of Omagh Presbyterian church, where she was an active worker. Funeral will be held this (Thursday) afternoon with interment in Omagh Presbyterian church cemetery.

Charles William Martin

Death called one of Milton's highly esteemed business men and residents in Charles William Martin Tuesday afternoon, in his 81st year, after a short illness. He was one of a long line of millers owning and operating a grist and flour mill was built by his grandfather, in 1818.

Mr. Martin was prominent in the affairs of the town, being a member of both the public and high school boards, and counselling for a number of years. He was one of the board which was responsible for building of the present high school here.

He was an active member of Grace Anglican church, a past warden in 1932, and a member of the Legion, 1933, and established the Harrison Mills, which he operated for fifteen years. Coming east, he continued the operation of his mill here until retiring eleven years ago after a severe illness.

The funeral will be held this (Thursday) afternoon with interment in Evergreen cemetery here.

Junior Farmer Club Program Planned For 1941

Agricultural Club Projects for boys and young men 12 to 20 years inclusive are now in the course of organization for 1941. J. E. Whitlock, Agricultural representative for Halton in calf club work, two clubs will be organized, namely a Holstein Calf Club and a Jersey Calf Club. The former is being sponsored by the Halton Holstein Breeders' Club at the latter by the Halton Jersey Breeders' Cattle Club. In both clubs the project calls for the entering of a heifer calf born on or after January 1st of this year. Calves may be either grade or pure bred. The Achievement Day for both clubs will, we understand, be held in conjunction with the annual fair of the Halton Agricultural Society at Grain Club, which was organized in Milton. In Nelson Township the Boys' Club will continue its second year programme with oats under the sponsorship of the Halton Crop Improvement Association.

A pure bred Bacon Litter Competition open to Halton farmers of any age is also in the course of organization.
