Will Celebrate His 89th Birthday

With the honor and respect due to a pioneer of this district who played his part in developing this community, one of our grand old men, Mr. John Bousfield, will celebrate his 89rh birthday on Monday, June 16. Mr. Bousfield was born in 1852, just 15 years after Queen Victoria ascended the throne. He was about 12 years of age at the start of the Civil War in the U.S.A. and 15 at the time of Confederation. He has witnessed all of Canada's political battles and has been a staunch Liberal throughout his life. He was born on a farm near Carlisle. Ont., and was the eldest of a family of thirteen. This farm, still in the Bousfill name, was also the site of his father's saw mill, the centre of most of the community lumbering. To this farm came many seeking the fortune of the famous Captain Kidd, American slave master, who was once sought by the British. The story was that he had buried his gold in a field which has been named "California Field." Mr. Bousfield has two sisters and one brother still living, Mrs. Elizabeth Troyer, of Didsbury. Alta., will celebrate her birthday on June 18 and will be 87. The two youngest of the family are Mrs. Wm. Garbutt, of Milton and Mr. Mathias Bousefied, of Campbellvil e Since the passing of his sister Mrs. William Main with whom he had live I for years, he has made his home with her daughte - Mrs. R. J. Burnfield, at Milton. La February Mr. Bousfield suffered a stroke from which he seems to have fully recovered and to be in his usual good health. 
