each man receives a mailed individual personal notice of his call to training, as his period arrives, a number of enquiries are still being sent direct to Ottawa. Major-General La-Fleche, Associate Deputy Minister of The Department of National War Services, under whose direction the mobilizing of trainees is being carried out, points out that the Regulations have been planned to smooth out possible difficulties for the trainee by dividing Canada into thirteen Admin istrative Divisions, with officials and headquarters offices in each Division, authorized to handle procedure and operations locally.

To the Divisional Registrar of National War Services in the area in which they are registered should be forwarded all communications concerning business arising from the provisions of National War Services Regulations. All men from 19 to 45 are warned that notification must be given promptly of change of address of marital status. Failure to do so incurs the risk of fine or imprison-
