GRAY COACH LINES

YOUTH PINNED BENEATH CAR IS KILLED NEAR GEORGETOWN

James Boyle Loses Life—Companion Escapes With Bruises After Auto Hits Gravel

Georgetown, Aug. 18.—When the car in which they were riding struck loose gravel near the Norval station Saturday night, James Boyle, 18, of Georgetown, was killed, and his companion, William Clark, 18, also of Georgetown, received bruises and cuts.

The pair was driving south on a country road just south of the Norval C.N.R. station in Boyle's car. Clark was thrown clear of the car when it overturned. Boyle was pinned in the wreckage.

Both youths were taken to the farmhouse of Edward Greensward, where Boyle died, suffering from a crushed chest. Cause was attributed to a hemorrhage. Dr. R. Paul, of Georgetown, attended the lads. Clark was able to return to his home following treatment.

Coroner Dr. McNiven, of Acton, was called. Traffic Officer William Herman, of Brampton, and Provincial Constable Revely of Milton, investigated, assisted by Chief of Police William Marshall, Georgetown. No persons were charged in the accident. No inquest will be held.

Surviving Boyle are his parents, who have lived in town for over ten years, one brother, William, of the R.C.A.F., and one sister, Kathleen. James was a member of the juvenile hockey team in Georgetown.
