### Dr. Charles S. Hardy

(Contributed)

The subject of this article, Dr. Charles S. Hardy, of Summit, N.J., has been visiting his brother, John Hardy, of Milton, and William, of Streetsville.

Dr. Charles S. Hardy is of Scotch ancestry, a descendant of the original Hardie in Scotland.

The Hardy family in Scotland are descended from the LeHardie family of France. The establishment of the family in Scotland was in 1334, when two LeHardie brothers came to Scotland from Normandy with King David the Second, on his return as a boy of eighteen to be crowned King of the Scots, and by David the Second these brothers were given grants of land south of Edinburgh, near the city of Edinburgh in Scotland, which was held in the family for over 350 years. There has been during these intervening generations many members of the family who succeeded to positions of note in the British Empire, such as:

The Rev. Thomas Hardy, who became President of the University of Edinburgh, and the Hon. J. Hardy, who has contributed men distinguished in medicine and literature, as well as the Ministry, and others have been high ranking officers in the British Army and Navy. Sir Thomas Hardy, a distinguished Naval Commander, who fought under Nelson in the "Battle of Trafalgar."

The last Governor of New York under the British, was a descendant of the Hardy family, and the second last Governor of New Jersey, Josiah Hardy, was also a descendant of the Hardy's of Scotland.

Dr. Charles S. Hardy, the son of John Hardy, Esq., was born at "The Willows", the family homestead near Milton, Canada, and is a graduate of the University of Indiana, U.S.A., where he received his dental degree.

He first started his career in dentistry in Detroit, Michigan, and later practiced in Montclair, New Jersey, and later settled in Summit, N.J., opening an office there forty-five years ago.

Dr. Hardy has several times been sent abroad by the National Dental Society of the United States, to give clinics in Europe. He received an appointment from The National Dental Society, as a clinician to the meeting of the International Medical Society of the United States, which was held in London, England, in 1911, on various subjects have been given abroad by Dr. Hardy, before the British Dental Society, and before the American Dental Society of Europe, in London, England, and before the International Dental Society of the World in Paris in 1931. He has repeatedly given clinics before the National Dental Association at its annual meetings in the various cities of the United States, and at different times before the New Jersey State Dental Society, and the New York Dental Society.

In addition to his other professional affiliations, Dr. Hardy has been an active member of the New Jersey State Dental Society for many years. He is one of the charter members of the Union County Dental Society, and was honored recently with a complimentary banquet, and was one time its president. He was also active in the organization of the Summit Dental Club of Summit, N.J., and was for ten years its president. He was also at one time president of the Essex County Dental Society, and at a complimentary dinner given by this society, was presented with a gold key in honor of his accomplishments.

Dr. Hardy is now one of the senior members of the National Dental Society of the United States, and numerous times has been sent as a delegate by the New Jersey State Dental Society, to the annual meetings of the former American Dental Association, now renamed the National Dental Association of the United States.

As a result of a split in the New Jersey State Dental Society, some twenty-five years ago, Dr. Hardy took part in the reorganization of the Society, and in order to strengthen the position of the reorganization, and typical of his fighting resources, established the New Jersey Dental Journal, which is now sponsored and edited for several years, and which was used as a publicity organ to combat the opposition in the fight. This Journal is now the only dental journal published in the State of New Jersey.

Some years ago when a bill was presented to the Legislature, which was known as the Dental Hygienist Bill, presented by the New Jersey State Dental Society to permit licensing of Dental Hygienists to practice in New Jersey, Dr. Hardy objected to this bill, served notice that he would fight the bill, and in the passage of this measure, and when the Legislature met and the bill was presented, he waged his fight, until the bill was finally defeated in the New Jersey State Legislature.

The establishment of dental clinics in the public schools of Union County was a noteworthy event of thirty-five years ago, and is largely to be credited to the efforts of Dr. Hardy. The first step in the establishment of school clinics was taken by Dr. Hardy in connection with the Board of Education in Summit, where he succeeded in securing the local school board to establish the first clinic in this city, which was completely outfitted and financed by the late James W. Binwell, then president of the local Board of Education. After this clinic had been established, Dr. Hardy turned his efforts with the co-operation of Co. William B. Martin of Elizabeth, N.J., in the establishing of similar clinics in the various municipalities throughout the county, and every school in the county was provided with a dental clinic.

Dr. Hardy has contributed many things of importance to his profession, and probably the two of the most significance is the first device for casting gold inlays, ever put on the market, and another thing of outstanding significance is his orthodontic appliance for regulating teeth, devised in 1898 and which is today probably the most generally used in the popular system employed by dentists for this purpose.

He has always been interested in art, literature and music, and used to paint himself. He has at various times written poetry and articles for publication. He has been president of the Eastern Alumni Association of the University of Indiana, present of the Adeburo Club, a dental organization, and at one time president of the Central Dental Association of Northern New Jersey, and later president of the Union County Dental Society. He is a member of the Society for the Advancement of Science of Washington, and an Associate Fellow of the American Medical Association. A member of the Connaught Club of London, and a member of various other clubs and organizations of lesser importance.

As a result of all the above, Dr. Hardy has just recently been honored with the presentation of a Fellowship in the International College of Dentists, a world wide organization with a limited membership of less than five hundred fellows gathered from all over the world. He is also a member of the recently presented with a membership in the Academy of Science.

### RED CROSS NOTES

The following excerpts are from letters received from Mr. G. C. Bateman, Metals Controller, and Mr. T. C. Davis, Associate Deputy Minister:

"In view of the urgent requirements for aluminum to be used in home and other essential purposes, I am of the opinion that the people who donate aluminum scrap as well as those taking part in the actual collection, are performing a very useful duty at this time."

"It should be emphasized, however, that the campaign is primarily for the collection of worn out or useless articles. To donate serviceable utensils with the hope of replacing them by other metals would be defeating the purpose of assisting in the war effort."
