COUNTY COUNCIL

The last meeting of the Halton County Council for 1941 was held in Milton last Tuesday afternoon with the Warden and all members present.

The following communications were, in part, as follows: From Mr. G. F. Thompson, superintendent of the Children's Aid Society for Halton and Peel, re office space for the Society in the County Buildings.

From Rt. Hon. P. M. Dewar, Minister of Agriculture, re Mr. J. E. Whitelock: "I am pleased to acknowledge your letter, giving reference to the services of Mr. Whitelock."

The following resolutions were passed in open council: Moved by Mr. Finney, seconded by Mr. Hall, that the following accounts be paid: County Buildings, \$214.44; printing, \$79.67; hospital, \$41.25; finance, \$111.40; agriculture, \$20.00; Total, \$466.76.

Moved by Mr. Campbell, seconded by Mr. Chalmers, owing to past conditions we recommend that the tuition of Hilda Mary Taylor of Trafalgar, attending Port Credit high school, be paid by the County of Halton and that Port Credit high school be notified of this.

Moved by Mr. Blair, seconded by Mr. Craig, that Mr. Wm. Deans, as secretary of the Old Age Pensions and Mother's Allowance Board, be made a grant of \$100 efficient services rendered to the Board.

Moved by Mr. Craig, seconded by Mr. Chalmers that this Council extend to Mr. and Mrs. Charles Hill and Mrs. Wilson their deepest sympathy in the loss of their son, while serving with the R.C.A.F. in England.

Moved by Dr. Heslop, seconded by Mr. Robertson, that a vote of condolence be accorded Mr. Whitelock for his services rendered the county during the present year.

Moved by Mr. Gilbert, seconded by Mr. Finney, that he be granted to introduce a by-law to revert a portion of the County Road system to the Township of Trafalgar. By-law was given three readings and passed.

Moved by Mr. Finney, seconded by Mr. Hall, that this council recommend that the salary of Mrs. Yarraton be increased from \$60 per month to \$70, commencing January 1st, 1942, and that a copy of this resolution be sent to Peel County for their approval.

Moved by Mr. Finney, seconded by Mr. Cleave, that the thanks of this council be tendered the Warden, Mr. Kerns, for his courteous and impartial manner, in which he has presided over the deliberations of the Council and the prompt attention given business of the county during the year of 1941.

The Warden replied briefly, thanking members of the council for congratulating his year of office a pleasure by their support and co-operation.

Each member of the council then expressed his appreciation individually, but it was noted that the usual jovial conviviality which is characteristic of the last meeting of the year was conspicuously absent. Each member spoke as though, back of his every word and thought, was the knowledge of the chaotic conditions in the world to-day.

Possibly this knowledge was brought nearer home to the loss sustained by the Deputy-Reeve of Oakville, Mr. Chas. Hillmer.
