St. Paul's Church Annual Meeting

When St. Paul's United Church annual congregational meeting was held in the school Wednesday of last week, it was very successful. The past year had been a year of experience by the congregation and its many organizations.

During 1941 34 new members were added to the church roll, 24 of them being young people on profession of faith. Only 8 were removed by death and certificate, so the total membership has risen to 450.

Financial reports were made at home and abroad. The W. M. S. raised \$350, the Evening Auxiliary \$170, and the Mission Band \$50. The Ladies' Aid paid \$500 on the church mortgage, reducing it to \$900. The church at the Y. P. U. had increased from ten to twenty-three. The C.G.I.T., re-organized only last year, reported an average attendance of twenty-one and an income of \$50. The choir, with a membership of twenty-nine, reported that they had provided the music at two nearby church anniversary services. Average attendance of 120 increased offerings and 25 active officers and teachers featured the Sunday School report. The missionary offerings showed a slight decrease, but the contributions to local support were higher than usual.

A. S. Mahon, J. M. Denyes and J. S. Willmott were re-elected to the Session for a term of six years. W. A. Cripps, missioner, M. G. Clements were elected to fill the unexpired term of former members. G. E. Goodchild, E. B. Clements, J. E. Whitlock, J. E. McKinnon and S. A. Fay were elected to the Board of Stewards.

Two fine numbers were provided by the choir, and the refreshments served by the Official Board were enjoyed.

KNOX CHURCH

The annual congregational meeting of Knox Presbyterian Church was held in the school-room on Monday evening, Jan. 10th, with the Rev. Mr. Riddell in the chair and Mr. H. London secretary.

Financial reports of the various organizations were presented, and reports given showed that all organizations were in a flourishing condition. Arrangements were made between Knox, Boston and Omagh churches that Mr. Riddell continue as minister similar to a previous arrangement for six months.

Mr. Thos. Wilson was elected trustee. The following were elected to the Board of Managers for a three year term: Messrs. John Carr, Stewart Lockie, John Mitchell and George Smillie. Miss Adelaide Fraser was appointed Press Secretary for 1942.

Mr. George Dawson presented the auditor's report, showing that the church and all organizations had a successful year, in spite of so many other demands on people's time and money.

It was decided, unanimously, that \$2000 be invested in bonds in the new War Loan.

Votes of appreciation were tendered to the minister and his wife, Miss Dewar, Mrs. Lovie, Miss Blain, and the choir. Miss Blain was complimented on the very efficient manner in which the books are kept.

The meeting was closed by prayer, after which refreshments were served by the ladies of the congregations.

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TENDERS FOR COAL AND COKE

SEALED TENDERS addressed to the undersigned and endorsed "Tender for Coal" will be received until 3 p.m. (E.D.S.T.) Monday, February 9th, 1942, for the supply of coal and coke for the Dominion Buildings throughout the Province of Ontario.

Forms of tender with specifications and conditions attached can be obtained from the Purchasing Agent, Department of Public Works, Ottawa; and the Supervising Architect, 33 Adelaide St. East, Toronto.

Tenders should be made on the forms supplied by the department and in accordance with departmental specifications and conditions attached thereto. Coal dealers' license numbers must be given when tendering.

When the amount of a tender exceeds the sum of \$5000—whether it be for one building only or more—the tenders must attach to their tender a certified cheque on a chartered bank in Canada, made payable to the Honourable the Minister of Public Works, equal to 10 per cent of the amount of the tender or Bearer Bonds of the Dominion of Canada, or the Canadian National Railway Company and its constituent companies unconditionally guaranteed as to principal and interest by the Dominion of Canada, or the aforementioned bonds and tender a certified cheque, if required to make up an odd amount.

The Department also reserves the right to demand from any successful tenderer a security deposit in the form of a certified cheque or bond as above, equal to 10 per cent of the amount of his bid, to guarantee the proper fulfillment of the contract.

Red Cross Annual Report

The following is a complete report of the work sent to the Canadian Red Cross in 1941: Total number articles sent 14,991; total number of knitted articles 5,544; army socks 2715 pairs, seaman's sock 220 pairs, hospital stockings 149 pairs, hospital socks 90 pairs, V neck sweaters 227, turtle neck sweaters 132, turtle neck tank-tops 85, scarves 523, wristlets 45 pairs, mitts and gloves 753 pairs, h-mets and caps 472, bed jackets 6, bed shawl 1, abdominal belts 2, knee caps 2, amputation covers 29, ladies' articles 27.

Besides these we have sent 318 knitted articles to the local boys overseas.

WAR WORK REPORT—
The Milton Branch of the Canadian Red Cross with co-operating units have completed 157 articles. The following is a complete report:
Hospital Supplies—78 cotton sheets, 203 surgical towels, 20 convalescent sheets, 82 hospital bed gowns, 48 hospital bed jackets, 604 bandages, 10 hospital afghans, 38 dressing gowns, 450 handkerchiefs, 174 pairs pyjamas, 50 wash cloths, 12 Hampton bed pads, 14 pairs ward slippers.
British Civilians—376 quilts, 10 blankets, 374 layette garments, 20 night-gowns, 30 slips, 12 aprons, 25 babies' woolen shirts, 23 pairs children's mitts, 67 pairs children's socks, 72 pairs girls' bloomers, 60 children's sweaters, 64 dresses, 43 coats, 20 hats, 106 blouses, 54 skirts, 24 pairs boys' trousers, 23 boys' shirts, 20 pairs wind-breakers.

The co-operating units are Scotch Block W.I., Hornby W.I., Omagh W.I., Mountain Union W.I., Campbellville W.I., Campbellville Patriotic Society, Lunenburg Patriotic Society, Milton Heights Carry-on Club, Eden Women's Association. Also since June the Ladies' Auxiliaries of the Anglican, United and Presbyterian Churches of Milton have met in groups and helped with the sewing.

In addition we have had generous donations of quilts from the Rebekah Lodge, the United Church, Lowville, the Anglican Church, Lowville, the Free and Easy Club, Campbellville and the Dune Club, Milton.
