THE CANADIAN CLUB

"We are bound together by common traditions, peace and trade treaties, spiritual ties—a strange but strong tie." Rev. Ross Cameron, Dovercourt Presbyterian Church, Toronto, told a large attendance at the initial banquet of the Milton Canadian Club held at the Milton Inn last Friday. Sheriff W. J. L. Hampshire, president elect, was in the chair.

Mr. Cameron outlined the progress of the British Empire since the signing of the peoples' treaty. "The British Empire should be foremost in the peoples' thoughts to-day," he advised. "In building an empire we find good and evil, but the good outweighs the evil in any given age. For centuries Britain has been against piracy and slavery and she never made designs by fighting for honor. Every battle she won has been for her sole protection. Critical remarks by some of our speakers which give us a confidence. We have the finest legal and educational systems in the world. Labor has its rights with a fine industrial thought. Had we not this freedom on this continent we might have found ourselves similar to those countries on the southern hemisphere."

A vote of thanks and appreciation was given to L. Skuce and Rev. S. A. Kirk for one of the finest addresses heard at the Canadian Club.

The president announced that Wm. J. McCullough, telegraph editor of the Hamilton Spectator, would be the speaker at the February banquet.

Forms of tender with specifications and conditions attached can be obtained from the Purchasing Agent, Department of Public Works, Ottawa; and the Supervising Architect, 36 Adelaide St. East, Toronto.

Tenders should be made on the forms supplied by the Department and in accordance with departmental specifications and conditions attached thereto. Coal dealers' license numbers must be given when tendering.

When the amount of a tender exceeds the sum of \$5000—whether it be for one building only or more—the tenders must attach to their tender a certified cheque on a chartered bank in Canada, made payable to the honor of the Minister of Public Works, equal to 10 per cent of the amount of the tender or Bearer Bonds of the Dominion of Canada or the Canadian National Railway Company and its constituent companies unconditionally guaranteed as to principal and interest by the Dominion of Canada, or the aforementioned bonds and a certified cheque, if required to make up an odd amount.

The Department also reserves the right to demand from any successful tenderer a security deposit, in the form of a certified cheque or bond as above, equal to 10 per cent of the amount of his bid, to guarantee the proper fulfillment of the contract.
