MORE RATIONING

Predictions come out of Ottawa that rationing may have to be extended to quite a number of commodities. People should reflect that such rationing would be largely due to the fact that many people are not satisfied with normal supplies, but want more than that. Instead of buying five or ten pounds of sugar at a time, as people have commonly done up to the war period, they have laid in fifty or one hundred pounds.

Automobiles will be scarce, because the motor plants are needed to make munitions, and rubber tires are scarce because the tarde routes to the Far East are cut. Thanks to our grand products, there seems to be enough food and clothing for everybody. So let us not fear imaginary shortages, and let us not buy so far in advance of our needs that rationing will be needed on many commodities.

The tables cannot be turned in a night. Patience is imperative. Then bit by bit the handicaps are overcome and the necessary war material becomes available.

The Y. P. U. of the United church will present a play, "Mama's Baby Boy," on March 4th in the church.

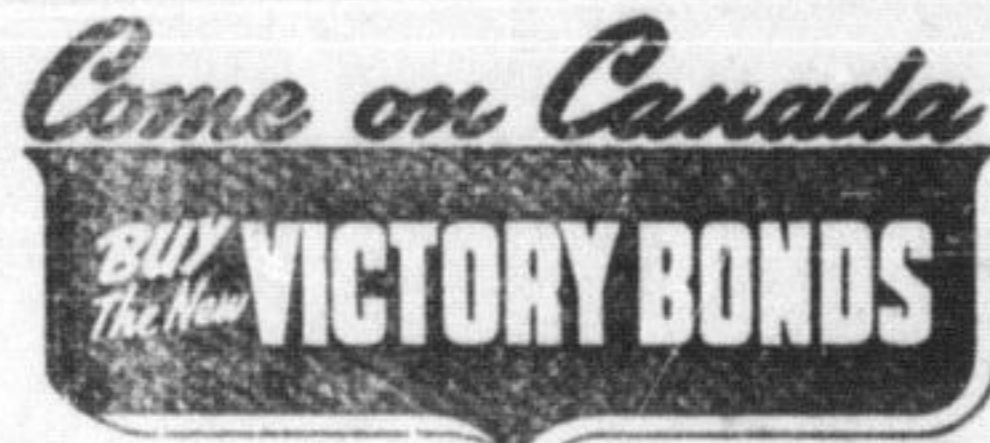
The Women's World Day of Prayer will be observed on Friday in St. George's Anglican church. The ladies of the United church will unite with St. George's ladies.

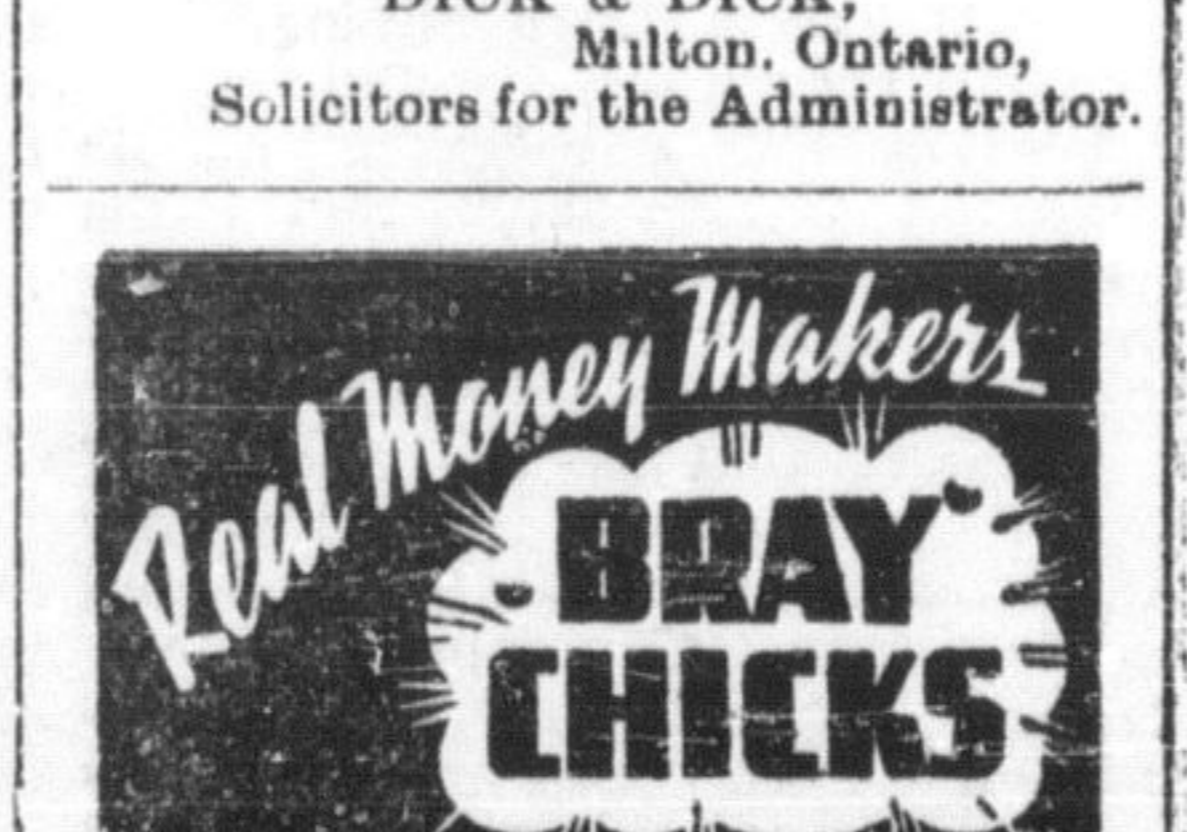
