In high blood pressure, it is important to eat sufficient meat so that the blood will not lack proteins. The best medical opinion holds that diet, so long as it is not abnormal, has nothing to do with high blood pressure.

Electrocardiograph tests made under conditions of exertion by the patient or when pain is being felt by him will reveal a heart defect undiscoverable under other conditions. Frequently such minor changes as moving from upper to lower floor lor nearer to a car line which connects with his place of work will prolong a heart patient's life for many years.
