Mayor Dawson Is Chairman.

At a meeting of local business men in the council chamber last Friday night to organize the Milton and district national war committee, Mayor George H. Dawson, who had successfully organized the two previous Victory Loan campaigns, was elected chairman. Other officers are: T. A. Hutchinson, vice-chairman for the different townships; Nelson, C. Readhead; Trafalgar, Victor Hall; Esquesing, Edwin Harrop.

The committee in charge of war saving certificates is: R. McAndless, chairman; E. W. Foster, for schools; Charles Clark, for merchants; Victory Loan chairman, Dr. C. A. Martin; sales committee, H. C. McEwan; public relations committee chairman, William Anderson. Dr. C. A. Martin was chairman.

L. C. Amos, county organizer, stated the drive was for the purpose of increasing the sale of war saving certificates and stamps through every possible outlet.

LETTER FROM OVERSEAS

The C.A.T.S. Milton detachment, are very happy in the receipt of the following letter from Arthur W. Smith, prisoner of war, Germany, May 4, 1942.

Dear Mrs. Bowring:
It gave me much pleasure to go up to our parcel barrack and receive that cigarette parcel that you sent me. I knew it was coming as my mother had notified me in one of her letters. It was something that I was very much in need of and I think it was very good of you to send them to me. I thank you a million times for it. I have been here a year last March 15 so I am getting used to being a prisoner of war now. There is quite a number of Canadian boys here in this camp. Things are not too bad here, although the Red Cross food parcels are very regular. Well we must hope all will turn out for the best in the end and that we shall soon see our dear ones. Thanks again for your parcel and the best of luck in your good work.

Arthur, son of Mr. and Mrs. Smith, of Milton, being the only prisoner of war in this community, was adopted by the C.A.T.S. last September, since which time parcels of cigarettes have been sent at regular intervals. Our best wishes go with the cigarettes to Arthur and all prisoners of war.

LETTER FROM ENGLAND

Lorne Scots Detachment, No. 1 Can. Gen. Reinforcement Unit, Canadian Army Overseas.

The Editor, The Canadian Champion, Milton, Ontario.

Dear Sir,
I wish to take this opportunity to thank you very much for being so kind as to send the Champion over to me every week. I appreciate it very much and it is really good to get the Home Town paper and read all that is going on back there. There are several little items that we do not get in letters from the folks at home, but which I notice in the paper. At present I am stationed in the city of London, and it is really surprising how they have got the city all cleaned up after those big bombings that they have had to put up with. The spirit of the people over here is 100 per cent. perfect and I am sure that they are all waiting for the day that they pick up their morning paper and read where the invasion of Europe has begun, and the way England is hitting back at Germany now it should not be very long.

MAIL YOUR APPLICATION CARD FOR COUPON RATIONING AT ONCE!

After July 1st no one will be able to purchase sugar for regular domestic use without turning in a ration coupon.

Application cards for coupon rationing for sugar have now been mailed to every household in Canada. But, in an undertaking so vast, some homes may have been missed, or some cards may have gone astray. So, no matter where you live, whether it is in areas served by letter carrier or not, if your application card is not already on its way to Rationing Headquarters, you should wait no longer.

After filling in the card, according to the instructions on the pamphlet which was delivered with it, just drop the card in the nearest mail box or post office. It needs no forwarding address.

IF YOU HAVE NOT RECEIVED AN APPLICATION CARD you should get one at the nearest Post Office at once.

All Post Offices have received full instructions to rush application cards for coupon rationing to the nearest Wartime Prices and Trade Board Office, where they will get immediate attention and the coupon ration cards mailed right back to you.

The ration cards being issued for use July 1st are for sugar only, and good for 10 weeks. At the end of that period a coupon ration book good for 6 months will be issued. Under the new system of coupon rationing, you are allowed the same

amount of sugar as at present—1/2 lb. per person per week. The same provision as at present for additional quantities for preserving and jam and jelly making will be continued. Special voucher forms for this purpose are being supplied all retailers.
