POLICE COURT

Frank Benmore, Windsor, was remanded a week for sentence after he pleaded guilty in police court here on July 15th, to a charge of breaking and entering, committing a theft from the office of F. R. Gregory, Leamington, on June 8th. Benmore was sentenced to six months, a week ago, for theft in Burlington.

Robert Todd was remanded a week for medical evidence. He was charged after being found near C.P.R. tracks near Campbellville by Provincial Constable M. E. Hamilton.

Magistrate F. G. MacDonald committed John Einarsson, of Hamilton, to jail for seven days for driving a car while intoxicated. He was arrested Sunday morning by Constable Peter Danish on Coburne street in Oakville. The officer found a dozen bottles of beer in the car and one half full one fell out. On the second charge of having liquor in an unlawful place, contrary to the L.C.A., he was fined \$10 and \$8.75 costs. His car was ordered impounded for three months and the license of the accused was cancelled for 12 months. Einarsson gave his occupation as a machine hand in Toronto. He has been out on bail since arrested.

George Churchill and Donald Warr appeared to answer to the charge of misgiving property and theft of \$30 and a watch. They elected to be tried by His Worship and were acquitted. Charles Blackeney, of Centre avenue, Trafalgar township, was the complainant.

Blackeney was then charged with selling liquor contrary to the L.C.A. and the witnesses were Churchill and Warr. The magistrate said he was not favorably impressed by the witnesses and dismissed the charge.

Homemakers! This is important

Save every ounce of waste kitchen fat. Two pounds of fat will produce enough glycerine to fire five anti-tank shells. Glycerine is a vital necessity in the manufacture of explosives. This is one war effort which is up to the homemaker—your waste kitchen fat and meat drippings are valuable.

- 1 All fats must be rendered down.
- 2 Strain all fats into a clean wide-mouth container. An empty coffee tin, honey pail, or vegetable tin will answer perfectly as a container.
- 3 All containers must be perfectly clean.
- 4 Save this strained fat or dripping until your container is filled. Containers should be kept in a cool place to prevent fat from becoming rancid.
- 5 When container is full take or send it to Arnold's Fish and Chip Shop on Main Street. They have kindly consented to handle it for the Red Cross. If it is inconvenient for you to take containers yourself phone 72 and we will arrange to have them called for.
