OBITUARY

MRS. J. A. WALDIE

An esteemed resident of Milton for forty-five years, Mrs. J. A. Waldie passed away at her home on James St. last Friday night, after a lingering illness. She was born in Streetsville seventy-one years ago. She was an active member and workers of Knox Presbyterian Church. She was a charter member of Evening Star Rebekah Lodge. Surviving besides her husband are her sons, A. W. Waldie and James F. Waldie, both at home. The funeral took place on Monday afternoon, Rev. J. Riddell conducting the services. Interment in Evergreen Cemetery, Milton.

REV. CHARLES D DRAPER

Rev. C. D. Draper, of Beamsville, died in Alexandria Hospital, Ingersoll, on Sept. 19th, following a comparatively short illness.

Mr. Draper, a former pastor, had gone to Beamsville on Saturday, Sept. 15th, to conduct the service in the United Church of the following Sunday, morning, but was taken ill during the night. He was taken to Ingersoll Hospital for treatment, and died there. He was successful, and it was thought he would be out of the hospital within two weeks, when he contracted pneumonia and since then there had been no hope of his recovery. He passed away on Sept. 19.

Mr. Draper had had pastorates in Walsh, Hamilton, Niagara Falls, Fenwick, Milton, Toronto, Beamsville, Barrieville, Paris, Acton, and New Hamburg.

Mr. Draper has been living retired in Beamsville since his superannuation in 1912. He had a deep interest in the Ryerson School of which he was one of the organizers. He was 71 years of age.

Burial was made in Niagara Falls.

HOWARD FOUND GUILTY

Gordon Howard, 16, Oakville, was given suspended sentence for one year, ordered not to drive a car in Canada for three years, and ordered to pay \$50 towards the costs of the prosecution, when he was convicted by Judge W. W. Munro in county court last Thursday. The accused pleaded not guilty to a charge on July 26th in Oakville. According to Chief of Police David Kerr, who investigated the accident, he found the marks on Church street before the car made a right turn into the lane between the idward home and that of B. F. Walsh. The car went over a wooden curb, three feet of rough ground and a four-inch raise over the sidewalk. It travelled up the lane, crashing into the corner of the Walsh house, knocking over Florence Wilson, 300 bus, and a child in a Hamilton hospital from severe injuries. In his own defence, Howard stated he had never driven a car before. He purchased it during the afternoon of Sept. 1. He said that as soon as Blake Diltz, a roomer, had backed his car out of the lane, he proceeded to drive in. When he hit the bump at the sidewalk, the wheel was thrown out with his hands and he seemed to lock. He said he did not see the woman at the door. W. I. Dick appeared for the crown.
