Blood Donor Clinics

Mobile blood donor clinics, developed to tap donation sources in industry and other places unable otherwise to be reached, commence this week, going first to Barrie and Orillia. Eventually they will travel through Ontario to small towns and communities where there are no permanent clinics. In the past donors from outlying districts have been driven to and from the nearest permanent clinic by car. This method has now become impossible with increasingly severe restrictions on gas and tires. The 1942 objective for the Canadian Red Cross Volunteer Blood Donor Service has been set at 12,000 donations per week. This is more than double the 1942 donations.

Capture Parcels for Prisoners of War.

"Capture Parcels" containing shaving material, war necessities, and other necessities, sufficient for emergency needs are forwarded direct to prisoners-of-war in Italy and Germany directly Red Cross receives word of their imprisonment. The packages are shipped from the overseas office of the Society in London and their sending does NOT prevent the relatives from despatching the three month waiting parcels.

\$50,000 Worth of Christmas Cheer.

Christmas cheer for the Canadian Forces overseas will cost the Canadian Red Cross \$50,000 and it is expected that every member of the Society in the United Kingdom will have some cheerful reminder to brighten the day. Last year 4000 individual stockings, enclosing a pair of socks, food and other good things were made up and sent to all Canadian patients in the British Hospitals in the British Isles. The Red Cross overseas office personnel toured the hospitals on Christmas Day to give greetings on behalf of the Canadian Red Cross.

GENERAL ORDER

The Dominion Bureau of Statistics has found that the cost of living index number for October 1, 1942, is 117.8 (adjusted index 116.9) as compared with the cost of living index number for July 2, 1942, of 117.9 (adjusted index 117).

The Wartime Wages Control Order, P. C. 5963, provides in Section 48 (iv):

"the amount of the bonus shall not be changed unless the cost of living index number has changed one whole point or more since the last general order of the Board requiring an increase or decrease in the amount thereof."

The index number not having changed by one whole point or more since July 2, 1942, pursuant to the provisions of P. C. 5963 as stated, the National War Labour Board orders that the terms of its General Order dated August 4, 1942, shall continue to apply for the period November 15, 1942, to February 15, 1943, subject to the right of employers or employees to apply to a War Labour Board for authorization of payment of such an amount of cost of living bonus as a Board may determine to be "fair and reasonable," under the provisions of the Order.
