The Red Crss The Babies of Coventry

In the autumn of 1940 there was a night of unforgettable beauty. The air was so clear, the moon and stars so radiant, that the countryside looked like some vast, panoramic etching. Unforgettable beauty


and unforgettable horror, for, from dusk to dawn, German planes blotted out the starlight as they sped through the sky on their way to Coventry. In a nearby Midlands town a Canadian Military hospital had just been set up. The Medical Staff was on hand but the place was not yet opened nor supplied with nurses. On the morning after the raid on Coventry the hospital received its first patients-unannounced, unexpected and unprepared for-150 babies from Coventry and all under two years of age. The hospital staff took them in and turned to the Canadian Red Cross in Britain for help. Within two hours a staff of 14 nurses, layettes, feeding bottles and all other requirements for the care of the very young were on their way to mitigate the sufferings of those little casualties by moonlight.

In 1941 the Canadian Red Cross Society's shipments to the Armed Forces overseas, were as follows:-Canadian Army-222,961 articles of supply, 1,812 units of foodstuffs; British Army-70,798 supplies and comforts; Other Forces-123,208 supplies and
