Do You Know How to Tell When a Sardine Is One?

What is a sardine? Why is a sardine? When is a sardine not a sardine?

Many varieties of fry, including undersized herring and menhaden, have been tinned in vegetable oil and sold to satisfy sardine appetites. The true sardine, however, is not the dwarf fish it appears to be, but is the young of the pilchard.
The pilchard, a member of the great herring family, is plentiful in the waters of Europe's coast from the English channel to Sardinia, and it is from this Mediterranean island that the sardine took its name. The sardine canning industry of France's Brittany peninsula is nearly a century old. The excellent reputation of the Brittany product is due in part to the freshly pressed olive oil of the region, in which Brittany sardines are canned.

In American waters the pilchard ranges in abundance off the Pacific shore from Canada's Queen Charlotte islands to the Gulf of California. While Oregon and Washington fishermen know it as the pilchard, to Californians it is known almost exclusively as the California sardine. Large commercial quantities are landed at Monterey, Los Angeles, San Francisco and San Diego in the main season, August through February.

Bridge Completion Aids

Through Railroad Service

Flow of freight between Mexico and Guatemala has been slowed by the gap in rail transportation. The Mexican line came to a dead end in the river town of Suchiate. The river of the same name was both boundary and barrier. On the Guatemalan side is the town of Ayutla

Through northbound freight had to be unloaded on ox carts from cars of the International railways of Central America, and then hauled a mile to the river. There it was transferred to small barges for the river crossing. From the river motor trucks hauled it to Suchiate for shipment over the lines of the National railways of Mexico. The ferries have a maximum capacity of about a ton. Total daily tonnage handled was 40 to 50.

Another hitch was the difference in rail widths. To accommodate both standard and narrow gauge equipment, the new bridge there now carries three rails.

The bridge completes the Mexico-Guatemala link of the Pan America railway system which will supplement the Pan American highway now under construction.


Road Magnet for Scrap Collection

A "road magnet" built three years ago by the Chicago Surface Lines to collect sharp metal objects from streets traveled by its buses is doing its bit in collecting scrap for the war, according to the American Public Works association. Attached to the bottom of a special service truck, the battery-powered magnet collected 800 pounds of metal in July and more than 1,600 pounds in October from 195 miles of streets. Tin cans, nails, hairpins, paper clips, bottle tops and tobacco tins were included in its "haul." The device is similar to one built by the Missouri state highway department to clear state highways of tire-destructive metals. Road magnets also are used by public transit systems in Milwaukee and Philadelphia for the same purpose.

Vitamin Starvation in 2700 B. C. Vitamin starvation has plagued man for centuries. As far back as 2700 B. C. there are records of beriberi. More than 400 years before Christ, Aristotle spoke of "night blindness" and observed shrewdly that it could be cured by eating liver. Scurvy is described in the annals of the Crusades. Pellagra was noticed in American Indians as early as 1600 A. D. While these acute deficiency diseases are comparatively rare here, they are rampant in Nazi-conquered Europe. In this country the milder, borderline or twilight deficiencies are today's major nutritional problem, with recent experiments indicating that no more than one person in a thousand escapes some effects of under-

nutrition.



Men Born From 1902 to 1924 Must Prove Compliance With Mobilization Regulations When Asking Permits to Seek Employment

BY Order pursuant to National Selective Service Civilian Regulations, a change is now made in the issue of permits to seek employment.

After April 30, 1943, permits may be refused to any man born from 1902 to 1924, inclusive, who has reached 19, unless he presents satisfactory evidence of compliance with Mobilization Regulations, in one of the following forms:

(a) A certificate of discharge from His Majesty's Forces during this war; or (b) a rejection slip issued by the Army on application for enlistment; or (c) a certificate of medical examination from the Registrar of a Mobilization Board; or (d) a postponement order certificate from the Registrar of a Mobilization Board; or (e) if born from 1902 to 1916 inclusive, a statutory declaration on form available in employment office, that he is not a "single person" under Mobilization Regulations.

Documents in (a), (b) and (e) above need be presented only the first time a permit is sought after April 30, 1943, unless asked for by a Selective Service Officer. Documents in (c) and (d) above must be presented each time a permit is applied for.

(1) Male persons applying for permits by mail should forward with their applications the evidence re-

quired, except (e) above.

(2) A Selective Service Officer MAY furnish a permit without first being handed evidence, where the applicant's services are required for immediate employment, or where a permit is asked for by mail, but in these cases the evidence must be presented to the Selective Service Officer later, usually WITHIN THREE DAYS of the issue of the permit.

All men born from 1902 to 1924, who have reached age 19, are urged to co-operate with your Employment and Selective Service Office. Bring your documents with you.

Algiers Has Population

Well Over 250,000 Mark

American occupation of Algiers
gives the United Nations control not
only of the capital and leading port
of France's huge colony of Algeria,
but also a geographic position of key
significance along the North African

About halfway between the Moroccan and Tunisian borders, it is less than 400 airline miles across the Mediterranean from the nearest ter-

Algiers is the largest city in Algeria with a normal population well over 250,000. It was one of the leading French African naval bases on the Mediterranean and the terminus of a network of roads spreading back into the Algerian hinterland, as well as along the Mediterranean shore.

Since it was connected by sea and air lines with Marseille (chief seaport of France), Algiers was also—until the launching of the North African campaign—a vital shipping point for food and other supplies sent from North Africa to the mother country.

As a temporary home to the American forces of occupation, Algiers has a considerable climatic advantage over many of the other war theaters around the world. It enjoys moderate weather and bright, sunshiny days which made it, in peacetime, a popular health resort for vacationists from the continent.

Tunisia's 'Southern Resort'

On Yankee Tripoli Route
Gabes, toward which American troops are moving in southern Tunisia, is a port town of 20,000 people and has the only oases of north Africa that lie directly on the Mediterranean coast, says a National Geographic society bulletin. At Gabes the Tunisian coast turns sharply eastward to meet the coast of Libva.

The position of Gabes at the right angle turn in southern Tunisia's coast line makes the town a way station on many routes from the Algerian to the Libyan coast. It is mid-way on the 450-mile coast road from Bizerte and Tunis to Tripoli. It is eastern terminus of the | Morocco - Algeria - Tunisia railroad network. A 700-mile chain of chotts northwest of the town forms a sort of natural highway. These chotts are shallow desert lakes from December to April each year. During the remainder of the year they are hard-surfaced dry salt flats like those of Utah on which record-breaking automobile speeds have been

Cities' Cash Reserve Funds

By gaining the right from the 1942 legislature to set up cash reserve funds, Massachusetts cities, like local governments of eight other states, are permitted to lay aside current cash now for public improvements in the future.

Municipalities in most of these states are taking advantage of such laws at this time to provide financing of public works projects for employing manpower released after the war, according to the American Municipal association.

The Massachusetts law is an emergency measure allowing municipalities to invest up to one-tenth of 1 per cent of their total valuation each year in defense bonds for expenditure on capital outlays after the war. No bonds held under the act may be sold prior to the end of the war.

The other states with reserve fund laws on their statute books are New York, Michigan, Washington, Kentucky, New Jersey, California, Nebraska and Oregon.

Fluorescent Light

Fluorescent lamps are available in a variety of colors, but the two most important colors in general lighting applications are the daylight and 3,500-degree white. The daylight fluorescent lamp has been designed to produce approximately the same color as is obtained from the north window on an overcast day, says Harris Reinhardt in the American Paint and Oil Dealer.

Daylight fluorescent lamps may be characterized as a "cool" light source, while the 3,500-degree white lamp produces a "warmer" color. Beautiful shades of paint can be selected through simple tests with fluorescent lighting to produce the psychological illusions of warmer or cooler interior atmospheres than are indicated by the thermometer—a practical potential in these wartime days of fuel conservation and restricted production of air-conditioning equipment.

An Old Spanish Custom Conquest on the North African

front has been an old Spanish custom since the time of Columbus. Agreements with other European powers later cleared the way to the present protectorate. Public affairs are administered by a commissioner stationed at Tetuan, capital and largest city. Morocco's Sultan delegates his authority to an official he selects from candidates put up by the Spanish government. Sharpshooting Riff tribesmen did not take kindly to the Spanish regime and staged occasional uprisings. The revolution which lifted General Franco to national leadership had an early chapter in this Spanish outpost. The Protectorate has few hard surface roads, though towns once reached only by camel caravans are linked by bus routes.
