# CANADIAN CLUB

Senator Benes, who will speak at the Canadian Club to-morrow night, is a brother of the former President of Czechoslovakia. His former National Director of Public Schools in that country and was born in Bohemia in 1878.

At the declaration of the last Great War he was almost immediately conscripted to serve in the Austrian army. He, however, made a successful escape to the United States, where he organized the Czechoslovakian movement for the liberation of Czechoslovakia from the Austro-Hungarian oppressors. After the World War he returned to the Republic of Czechoslovakia, in whose creation he had such a share. There he commenced the reorganization of the schools and later was made National Secretary.

In 1921 he was elected a member of parliament and in 1934 became a senator. In the autumn of 1938 he visited the United States and after the Munich catastrophe he did considerable speaking in America before he returned to Brno in December, 1938. After the invasion and seizure of Czechoslovakia by Hitler, Senator Benes realized that his life was in danger, and finally, in June 1939, he and his wife escaped a second time, after many gruelling and perilous experiences, returning to the United States from Russia.

The organization of Europe, especially of Central Europe, is actually in the spotlight of international interest. Senator Benes has contributed for many years in the foreground of the efforts to establish a firm democratic foundation for Central European organization. He is therefore an expert in this field and can contribute to the elucidation of these problems.

Members should make a special effort to hear this distinguished personage.
