BIG EATERS UNDER RATIONS

How are these persons with big appetites going to fare under rationed foods? On some of the rationing programs, such as on gasoline and fuel oil, the effort is made to consider individual needs, and give more of these supplies to those who need

If the attempt was made to ration

food on that principle, it would prob-

ably be a failure. The big eaters who perform great stunts of physical work might say they need two or three times more eats. It would seem a hopeless task to make such a discrimination. The small eaters will probably get

along pretty comfortably. Yet the big eaters may groan before the ratlioning ends.
