FEEDING THE GRASS

People may have trouble in developing a smooth green lawn, and frequently the difficulty is that they do not put enough fertilizer on it. Grass, like any kind of plant, needs food to make it grow.

If the cut grass is raked up, the soil is constantly losing some of its richness when the grass grows, and something needs to be put back into the soil to grow a new crop of grass.

If the cut grass is not raked, part of its life may go back into the soil again, but even then the lawn probably needs regular fertilizing.

When you see a nice green lawn with grass growing thickly, that lawn has usually been given plenty of plant food.
