HE PLAYS BEETHOVEN

GEORGETOWN BREEDER BUYS BULL AT \$1,200.

Harold Bingham and Son, Georgetown, paid the top price for a bull of \$1,200 at the Annual National Holstein sale held May 31 at Brampton. The animal was Glenafton Rag Apple Monogram, a very richly bred four months old calf, consigned by J. J. E. McCague, Alliston. His dam is an outstanding cow with a yearly record of 840 lbs. butterfat. Bingham's also sold two heifers, receiving \$420 for a yearling and \$310 for a six months old calf.

R. C. Given and Son, Georgetown, sold three head, a four year old at \$700 to Henry W. Bauman, Floradale, a two year old for \$400 and a nine months old bull calf for \$150. A trio of two year old consigned by Dr. Charles N. Blanshard, Freeman; H. A. Dolson and Son, Georgetown, and E. Segsworth, Freeman, brought \$600 \$375 and \$340 respectively and a five year old offered by F. Pelletier, Milton went for \$235. Wilfred Leslie, Georgetown, secured a six months old bull calf from R. Ray McLaughlin, Oshawa for \$560.

The general average of \$621.33 and the top price of \$3,900 for a female have not been beaten at a National Sale since 1920. The top price was paid by H. J. McFarland, Picton, to Hays and Co., Calgary, for an eleven months old heifer calf.

A feature of this sale was the drawing of the lucky ticket on a heifer calf which earned \$13,000 for the Red Cross. This animal, Glenafton Laurel Blossom, was won by James Sharpe Moose Jaw, Sask., who had her auctioned off, she bringing \$1,600, half of which also went to the Red Cross. Her final owner was H. L. Guilbert, Vercheres, Quebec. This brings to a total of \$38,000 the funds raised by the members of the Holstein-Friesian Association of Canada for War Charities in the past four years.

COTTAGE RENTS GOVERNED BY RENTALS ORDERS

The Wartime Prices and Trade Bd. draws attention to the fact that rentals charged for summer cottages are distinctly governed by the Wartime Leasehold Regulations.

In the case of accommodations of this type, the rental charged for them during 1941 and 1942 becomes the ceiling at which they may be rented this season. No increase can be made unless authority for such increase has been received from the Local Rentals Committees or the Rentals Administration.

Rental cannot be varied without the approval of a Rentals Appraiser. If, for instance, use of a boat or any other additional facility is now included, the rental cannot be increased without approval being given.

A landlord cannot set his own terms for weekly occupancy if he has always rented on a monthly basis. Those regulations do not apply to housing or lands used exclusively for farm purposes.

CEILING PRICES ON USED CARS AND TRUCKS

To forestall any attempt at selling used cars and trucks above the ceiling prices which have been established for them, enforcement officers of the Prices Board have requested the co-operation of the public in reporting infractions.

Dalton Wells, enforcement counsel of the Board for Central Ontario, said today that everyone who has paid or been asked to pay what he feels is an exorbitant price for a used motor vehicle should communicate with the nearest local office of the Board.

Mr. Wells stated that the Board is very anxious to prevent any black market developing on used cars, and that it is only through the public reporting any such infraction that attempts to sell above the ceiling can be checked.

Special and Regular Meetings Esqueing Council

Deal With Contract, By - Laws and Revision of Assessments Of the Township

Esqueing Township Council held a special meeting on Thursday evening, May 4th. Councillors George E. Cleave, George Currie and Wm. A. Wilson were present. Reeve C. H. May presided.

Moved by Currie, seconded by Wilson, that the tender of Wallace Mackey Construction Co. of 85 cents per yard for 10,000 yards of gravel to be supplied, crushed and delivered on the roads of the Township be accepted, according to the terms of tender.—Carried.

Moved by Currie, seconded by Cleave, that the Reeve and Treasurer be empowered to sell the \$5,000.00 3 per cent. 1954 Victory Bond, and the \$2,000.00 Province of Ontario 4 1/2 per cent. 1944 Bond, and that the proceeds be invested in the 6th Victory Loan.—Carried.

A special meeting of Council was held on Saturday evening, May 6th. Deputy-Reeve G. W. Murray, Councillors Currie and Wilson were present and Reeve C. H. May presided.

Moved by Currie, seconded by Murray, that the Township Council purchase from Mrs. Violet Mummery a portion of her gravel pit, lying west of the fence running south east from Lot 22 sideroad, Con. 5, Esqueing, for a distance of 200 feet south at a purchase price of \$600, it being understood and agreed that the said fence is to be moved ten feet in an easterly direction, to allow for a 50 per cent. slope from the hill top to the present road level in the property, and that should additional gravel be required to complete this season's road work, that said additional gravel be purchased from Mrs. Mummery at 15 cents a cubic yard. All fences taken down to be replaced and ground where gravel removed be left in a level orderly condition, and that the Treasurer be authorized to make payment of same.—Carried.

A Court of Revision for the Township of Esqueing was held Monday morning, June 5th at 10.30. George E. Cleave, George Currie, C. H. May, G. W. Murray and Wm. A. Wilson were present.

Having taken the required oath, George Currie moved that C. H. May be chairman of this Court of Revision.—Carried.

The appeal of James Mann, on assessment of buildings was sustained. Appeal by A. News, assessment on buildings reduced \$200 on Upper Canada College property. Appeal by Wm. T. Sinclair, on Upper Canada College property assessment was sustained.

Moved by Murray, seconded by Cleave, that the Clerk of this Court of Revision be and is hereby authorized and required to initial all corrections, reductions, alterations and additions made by this Court in the Assessment Rolls for the year 1944 and the assessment rolls as finally revised and corrected, be now passed by this Court and the Clerk be authorized to certify to said rolls.—Carried.

Esqueing Township Council held their regular meeting on Monday afternoon. Members were all present with Reeve C. H. May presiding.

A letter from Mr. A. McLaren Ontario Farm Service Force, was read describing the work of the Farm Commandos.

C. B. Swackhamer and R. L. Davidson, addressed Council asking for a grant to Acton Fair Board. The Reeve on behalf of the Council promised to deal with their request at a later date.

The following accounts were passed for payment: Bell Telephone Co., services, \$7.40; John Standish, refund dog tax paid, 2.00; Cecil Chisholm, dog licenses, letters etc., 93.69; A. W. Benton, dog licenses, etc. \$83.96; Township of Nassagaweya, 50 per cent. of relief given one family, 11-03; A. W. Benton, stamps, 7.00; N. A. Robinson, 1 registered ewe killed, \$35.; Spencer Wilson, valuator, \$2.00.

Moved by Cleave, seconded by Murray, that road accounts be paid, 2674.69; moved by Murray seconded by Currie, that relief accounts be paid, 93.51.—Carried.

A by-law to prohibit the dumping of rubbish on the highways of the Township was read and passed by Council.

Another by-law to restrain the running at large and trespassing of animals was also passed at this meeting.

Jos. Sanford was appointed pound keeper for the Township. Council adjourned to meet again on July 3rd or at the call of the Reeve.
