NEW YORK (CP)—The lowly milkweed, scourge of ranchers and farmers, is going to war as a substitute for scarce kapoc in life preservers according to the War Food Administration.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture in conjunction with other government agencies is preparing to collect seed pods for the milkweed floss in 26 states. While New York and New England will contribute some, most of the floss will probably be collected in the southwestern states, the WFA said.

The regular semi-monthly meeting of Milton Council was held at the town hall on Tuesday evening. Councilors, Ptolemy, Gowland, Buck, Fay and Reeve Heslop were present with Mayor Dawson presiding.

A. E. Wilson reported that a settlement had been made on a claim of Frank Cartwright. James Proctor and Redfern presented a booklet of the work that had been done by their company of engineers on sewage disposal plans.

Bell Telephone reported completion of certain work in the last few years. They wanted a certificate signed by a member of the Council. Council authorized the signing of this document.

A special meeting was arranged to discuss the sewage disposal question and also to take up with the assessor the question of assessing the corporation. This meeting is to be held on Tuesday July 11 at 7.30 p.m. Council adjourned at 12.35 a.m.

TORONTO COMMANDOS RESPOND TO DISTRESS CALL HALTON FARMERS

In a recent interview with Agricultural Representative J. E. Whitlock we learned that, to date, seventeen Halton farmers have secured Western farm hands. Needless to add, this is far short of the number required as we understand that there are applications for seventy-five of these men on file at the Agricultural office in Milton.

In addition, Toronto Commandos have stepped into the breach and have helped out on some twenty-five or thirty farms in the County. Some of these men are holiday workers and are spending one or two weeks in helping in the critical situation facing Ontario farmers. For the most part these men are being transported free of charge by the T. Eaton Company and the Robert Simpson Company and come out daily arriving at about 9.30 in the morning and return the same evening. A flat rate of 40c per hour has been set for this type of labour. With few exceptions we understand that Halton farmers who have received this class of labor are well satisfied.

May we suggest that if you can make use of this type of labour either by the day or for a longer period, you contact the Agricultural office in Milton, phone 230.

THIS WEEK

TORONTO (CP)—Possibility that Ontario may go into the air transport business is seen in the decision of the Provincial Air Service, the province's 20-year-old aerial fire protection organization.

In an interview on a recent trip to Sault Ste. Marie, Premier Drew made known the decision to extend the activities of the Ontario Provincial Air Service and its re-organization under the name Ontario Air Services.

The Premier did not make clear at once just what the re-organization would entail, but he did say:

"We believe that air communication throughout this province must be planned now. We are concerned about the decision of the Dominion government not to grant licences until the end of the war, and if this very unwise position is not changed, it will be necessary for us to adopt whatever measures are within our power to see that this province is not tied down in the development of essential means of communication, which we must have if we are to keep pace with modern developments.

"Unless plans are made for air routes now, we will not be ready to absorb the trained personnel which will be available when the war ends."

The Premier said the new Ontario Air Services organization will absorb the personnel of the present Ontario Provincial, which has 28 aircraft and is under the direction of the Ontario department of Lands and Forests. The present director is George Ponsford.

Retention of some of Canada's wartime controls to aid the farmers in the post-war period is advocated by H. H. Hannam. In an address at Toronto the president of the Canadian Federation of Agriculture said adequate income and stability for the farmer must be provided after the war and he suggested carrying forward some wartime controls into the post-war period "modified to meet the needs of changing conditions and peacetime objectives."

The Federation president also suggested formation of some type of regulated marketing; stability provided by export commitments arranged for through international agreements; decentralization of administration and a more efficient distribution.

The farmer, he said, is a skilled workman, and is entitled to economic awards as such.

A new headache is currently facing Alex. McLaren, Ontario director of farm services—how to get Ontario's huge tomato crop picked this year. Mr. McLaren says no one likes to pick tomatoes but never in his experience have so many people refrained from turning their hands to it than this season. The general help situation was improving he said—that is in everything but tomatoes. And starting in mid-August and continuing until mid-October, the farm services director anticipates real trouble in getting enough tomato pickers to handle the crop which is an essential source of vitamins.
