Son of A. H. DeForest, of Kilbride, Pte. DeForest went overseas with the Irish Regiment in March of this year.

The communities of Glen Williams and Georgetown were shocked and grieved to hear of the death overseas of Pte. Stanley Dickenson, on August 28. His mother, Mrs. James Dickenson received official notification in a telegram from Ottawa Monday morning. It stated that her son had been killed in action in France and that further information would be forwarded as it becomes available. His father, Spr. James Dickenson is on the Canadian Headquarters Staff in London, England, Herald.

Weekly War Commentary

Invasion By Air

Thousand of Allied airborne troops were landed in Holland on Sunday in a concentrated attempt to outflank the Siegfried Line and initiate a drive on northern Germany. The landing of the paratroops continued without let-up Monday when Allied headquarters announced that the airborne forces had joined with British ground forces in one area.

German accounts Tuesday placed the air troopers close to the city of Arnhem which is 15 miles north of the end of the Siegfried Line at Klive and 320 miles west of Berlin. The Nazi radio announced that airborne troops had entered the Netherlands centre of Eindhoven. It was near Eindhoven that British 2nd Army ground troops joined the airborne army after smashing across the border from the south.

Canadian troops on the Channel flank of the Allied Line have driven through Boulogne to the waterfront, cutting the enemy forces in the port into isolated pockets. The Canadians were also reported to be making progress in the eastern section of the front.

Early this week heavy fighting was going on in the German fortress city of Aachen, but southeast of the city the town of Busbach has been cleared of the enemy. The town of Hofen has been captured. The Germans are fighting desperately further south. Around the point of American penetration into Germany in the Pruem sector, the Americans have been meeting stiffening resistance and increased artillery fire.

Finns Out of War

The Moscow radio announced Tuesday that Finland has signed an armistice with Russia and Britain. It was said the terms would be announced later. Signing of the armistice ends negotiations which have been in progress since Sept. 14.

On the Russian front Soviet troops in the Baltic campaign threaten to trap 20 divisions in Latvia and Estonia as they menace the German supply line from East Prussia.

Prime Minister Churchill and President Roosevelt ended their conference at Quebec at the week-end. Both pledged their countries to fight for the defeat of Japan.
