Invasion By Air

Thousand of Allied airborne troops were landed in Holland on Sunday in a concentrated attempt to outflank the Seigfried Line and initiate a drive on northern Germany. The landing of the paratroops continued without let-up Monday when Allied headquarters announced that the airborne forces had joined with British ground forces in one area.

German accounts Tuesday placed the air troopers close to the city of Arnhem which is 15 miles north of the end of the Siegfried Line at Klive and 320 miles west of Berlin. The Nazi radio announced that airborne troops had entered the Netherlands centre of Eindhoven. It was near Eindhoven that British 2nd Army ground troops joined the airborne army after smashing across the border from the south.
