P.O. Ken Galloway Now Prisoner Of War In Germany

Missing Since July 31st Now
Listed as Prisoner According
to Word Received Here

Word was received on Friday by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. D. T. Galloway that Pilot Officer Ken Galloway is now a prisoner of war in Germany. On July 31st word was received that he was missing. Friends here will rejoice with the family in this encouraging word and hope for his safe return home.

Pilot Officer Galloway was a year ago reported missing over Burma and walked back through enemy territory and made his way back to his own lines. He was later granted leave of absence and spent Christmas at home in Milton. He enlisted in the RCAF in July 1940 and has been overseas more than three years.

His brother F.O. J. Galloway, DFM is now stationed in Ottawa and his parents and two sisters (Flora) Mrs. Travelon and Jean reside in Milton, and (Peggy) Mrs. Harold Lemott resides at Hornby.

Dr. G. I. Christie Speaker at Milton Canadian Club

"Reckless wastefulness" were the words used by Dr. G. I. Christie, President, Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph, and speaker at the Canadian Club of Milton meeting in the High School on the evening of Friday, September 22nd, in referring to the manner in which the lands in Halton County and other districts throughout the Province had been denuded of their forests, with the resultant shortage of water in many districts. Dr. Christie's reference had been prompted from a letter which was written in 1830 by an early settler of Nelson Township to relatives in the Old Land, in which he had stated that they would never want for timber or water. Much of Dr. Christie's address was of primary interest to farmers, and had to do with scientific methods which were being experimented with in an effort to restore fertility to farm lands. In closing his address, the speaker made reference to post war problems which will have to be faced, and made particular reference to the young men and women who will be endeavoring to find their places in civil life on the conclusion of hostilities, and asked that sympathetic understanding be extended to them.

Dr. Christie, who is always a welcome visitor to Milton, was introduced by J. E. Whitlock, Ontario Agricultural representative and F. H. Gilroy thanked the speaker on behalf of the Club. The meeting was in charge of Mr. G. F. Thompson, president of the Club, and Mr. Stanley Brown assisted at the piano.

Cpl. Lorne Black Milton Soldier Killed in Action

Had Run Trucking Business in
Milton Before Enlisting

Once again war's casualties have come to a Milton home when Mrs. Lorne Black (the former Evelyn White) received word that her husband, Corp. Lorne Black had been killed in action on September 14th. He was twenty-seven years of age.

Born at New Hamburg, Corp. Black received his education there. Before enlisting he ran a trucking business in Milton. He enlisted in 1941 and after training at Brantford, went overseas in June 1941. He was in England until D-Day when he went to France.

His parents, Mr. and Mrs. William Black reside in Toronto and one brother, Robert and a sister, Mrs. Robt. McCartney. Another brother Edward, resides in Burlington.

The wife and family have the sympathy of many friends here in the burden they have been called to bear.

First Milton Man in R. C. A. F. Returns from Overseas

The first Milton boy to join the RCAF and the first to go overseas, Flight-Sgt. Duncan McArthur arrived home on September 10th.

He enlisted on April 1, 1940, trained at Toronto and Montreal, going overseas in September, 1940. He was stationed in England doing wireless work, was attached to the RAF for two and a half years and the RCAF for a year. He also worked with the British Army and lastly served with Canadian Bomber Headquarters.

Sgt. MacArthur was twice mentioned in dispatches. His wife the former, Leading Airwoman Betty Winter whom he married in England, is now in Toronto. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles MacArthur, Thomas Street, Milton.

WITH THE CANADIAN ARMY IN ITALY (delayed)—Promotion of E. (Duff) Thompson, son of Mrs. N. J. Thompson, Commercial St., Milton, Ont., to the rank of corporal was recently announced at headquarters of the Irish Regiment of Canada in Italy. Cpl. Thompson is in an anti-tank platoon. As a section leader in one of the rifle platoons of "B" Company, Irish Regiment of Canada, and serving with the First Canadian Corps in Italy, K. Clement, husband of Mrs. Edith Clement, Milton, Ont., now holds the rank of lance-sergeant. His promotion was recently announced in the field by battalion headquarters.

Milton Fair Friday and Saturday Offers Attraction

Penitentiary Terms Given in Milton Court Yesterday

Several cases were disposed of in Police Magistrate Langdon's Court at Milton yesterday afternoon.

Harold Williams, Jr., and John Ford of Welland each were sentenced to three years in Kingston Penitentiary with 15 lashes on a charge of armed robbery at an Oakville service station September 2nd. Harold Dickie one of the trio was a week ago sentenced to three months definite and two months indefinite with five lashes on the same charge. All three entered a charge of guilty, but Williams and Ford were remanded a week for sentence, pending the outcome of a mental examination. The court were informed the men were examined by two qualified physicians and both were found to be sane.

The same three men pleaded guilty to a charge of breaking and entering the undertaking establishment of T. W. Heath, Mitchell, Ont., and were sentenced to 3 years to run concurrently with the previous sentence, except Dickie, who was sentenced to three months definite and two months indefinite. They were charged following breaking and entering the above establishment and taking a set of embalming instruments, a loud speaker, battery converter and a portable typewriter. All stolen articles were recovered.

Joseph F. Johns and Kenneth Van Berrichum were each fined \$10 and costs or 10 days on a charge of being intoxicated in Burlington.

William Adamson and Maurice Scarfe of Oakville were ordered to pay half the costs of prosecution, in default were to spend 30 days in the common jail and each were given suspended sentence for one year. Adamson is to report to police officer every month. In default he will spend 60 days in jail. Magistrate M. J. Langdon added if he were to enlist in the Navy he would not have to report. Both men were charged with stealing a hydraulic jack from Wm. Whitaker & Son.
