Council to Try to Have All Wood From Arena For the Winter Season

The regular meeting of the Milton Council was held on Tuesday evening. Councillors C. J. Riddal, S. A. Fay, S. Buck, G. C. Gowland, J. W. Higgins, R. H. Ptolemy were present, Mayor Geo. H. Dawson presided.

Mayor Dawson reported that he and the town solicitor had made an appointment with the building commissioner in Toronto but when they had attended the commission was unable to be present.

A letter from the Art Wire and Cable Co. replied to an enquiry re fire escapes for the Town Hall, stating that a representative would be in Town shortly to view the building. The 'teen club requested a rebate for the Town Hall as all their proceeds had been turned over to charity.

A letter from Bell Telephone notified the Council of the claim being made as the Town employees had damaged an underground cable while doing repair work. The account was held over for further information.

More Casualties Among Soldiers from Milton

Pte. C. A. Auger Missing—F.O. Wm. Hill, Burned—Pte. Lloyd McMurdo Injured

This week brought more casualties reported among the Milton soldiers. Pte. Chas. John Auger, is reported missing on September 14th according to word received by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Auger, Milton. This family has already felt the burden of war. Another son, Rfm. A. G. Auger, died as a result of wounds according to word received just three weeks ago.

Pte. C. J. Auger enlisted in Toronto in July 1942 and trained at Toronto, Orillia and Debert going overseas in November 1942. He was born in Milton and attended Milton Schools and before enlisting was employed with the P. L. Robertson Co. Another brother Harry is also serving in France. All will hope that good word may soon be received.

F.O. William Hill, son of Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Hill, was slightly burned when he and a friend were helping a crew member of a plane to escape. F.O. Hill and his friend were cycling in England when they saw a plane crash. All crew members but one had gotten out of the burning (Continued on Page Eight)

Holstein And Jersey Shows Feature At Milton Fair

Ross Segsworth and Maurice C. Beaty Premier Breeders and Exhibitors—150 Entries by Halton Holstein Breeders—80 Entries of Jerseys

The Halton County Holstein and Jersey Shows conducted by the Halton Holstein Club and the Halton Jersey Cattle Club, in co-operation with the Halton Agricultural Society, were again the outstanding features of the County Fair at Milton on Sept. 30.

Thirty Halton Holstein Breeders brought a total of 150 entries out, which reflected great credit on President W. H. Robinson and his fellow breeders. While the catchy weather and shortage of labor made it impossible for the cattle to come out in quite the bloom which they have done in former years, nevertheless in the opinion of judge J. M. Fraser of Streetsville, it was quite an outstanding show.

At the opposite end of the ring, the Halton Jersey Breeders brought out 80 entries, and in the opinion of judge Oswald Warman of Brampton, and Jas. Bremner, Secretary of the Canadian Jersey Cattle Club who was an interested spectator throughout the day, the quality was outstanding.

In the Holstein show, E. Segsworth & Son of Freeman was both premier exhibitor and premier breeder. Numbered among their wins were the Senior and Grand Champion on their 3 year old herd sire, Armac Sir George Chieftain Posch, first on their 3 year old dry cow, Spruceleigh Pansy; first in the Open Get of Sire Class on the Get of Glenroe Hartog Mercedes, which also won for them the coveted first on the Junior Progeny of Dam's Class, on the progeny of Poplar Row Chieftain Maid, which also won for them the Bank of Commerce Special. The same breeder headed the parade in the Senior Herd Class, and thereby secured the T. Eaton Company Special.

Dr. Chas. N. Blanshard of Freeman won the 2 year old Bull Class on Meadow Lochinvar, who was later declared Reserve Senior and Reserve Grand Champion.

The Junior Champion Bull was exhibited by J. L. Neelands & Son of Hornby, in Pioneer Lodge Koba Governor, while the winning senior bull calf was exhibited by A. T. Woodley of Milton, in Laurio Korndyke Rag Apple, and Morley Watson & Sons of Tansley had the winning Junior Bull Calf in Victor Banostine Pabst, which was declared Reserve Junior Champion.

In the Cow Classes, E. J. Meagher of Oakville, who is making his debut in the show ring swept the boards winning the Mature Dry Cow Class on Montvic Chieftain Bonnie; the Milking Cow Class on Buttermaid Lealand, who was later declared Senior and Grand Champion Female, and in the Milking 3 year Old, with an outstanding winner in Graymar Besie Pathfinder. It is interesting to learn that this heifer is now com-

pleting her two year old record, and in eleven months has produced over 20,600 lbs. of milk.

Elton McLean of Oakville was also a strong contender in the show, having the winning two Year Old in Milk, Dewdrop Rauerd Sharon; the winning Senior Yearling in Sybil Dewdrop Korndyke, which was later declared Junior Champion Female; and the winning Junior Get of Sire, in a strong class which brought out ten entries, on his Get of Moorebell Dewdrop Champion. The same breeder also winning the Junior Herd.

In the two year old Dry Heifer Class, Chas. Austin of Georgetown, another new exhibitor, was first with Evergreen Hill's Jemima.

W. H. Reid & Sons, also of Georgetown, in making their debut in the show ring, had the winning Junior Yearling in Plumbrook Bonnie H., which was later declared Reserve Junior Champion.

Frank Pelletterio & Sons of Milton, had the winning Senior Heifer Calf in Ashville Pietje Beauty, and Irvine Thompson of Hornby in a class of 17 Junior Heifer Calves had the winner in Woodglen Rita Supreme.

Chas. Austin and J. L. Neelands & Son had the winners in the Open Progeny of Dam Class, on the progeny of Lenox Jemima Hartog.

As usual at Milton perhaps the outstanding feature of the entire Holstein show was the exhibit staged by the Boys' and Girls' Calf Club, which this year brought out 18 entries. The winning calf was exhibited by David Pelletterio, with Irwin Thompson second; Douglas Alexander 3rd; Earl Ford 4th and John W. Pickett 5th.

In the showmanship feature of the Calf Club Show, first prize went to Ward Brownridge; David Pelletterio 2nd; Lorna Lawrence 3rd; John Stark 4th and Douglas Alexander 5th.

In the Jersey show, eight breeders brought out 62 head, while Maurice Beaty was successful in again winning the awards for premier exhibitor and premier breeder. Gerald Graham, Featherstone Bros., and Arthur Padbury, were strong contestants throughout. Padbury had the Senior Champion and Reserve Champion on Rochalda Wellborn Victor, and the winning two year old in milk, on Rochalda Aim's Alice.

Gerald Graham had the reserve Senior Male on Graham Farm Calliant Royalist, and the winning cow in milk, on Graham Farm Royalist Ruby.

Maurice Beaty came to the front with the winning Yearling Bull, in Brampton Basil Ward, which was later declared Junior Champion and the Grand Champion. The same breeder had the Junior Female Champion and Reserve Grand in his winning Senior Yearling, Lindale Draconis Sunray Lass. Beaty was again at the top in the three year olds in milk with Lindale Estella Gladys, and in the Junior Calf Class, with Lindale Draconis Flash 2nd. The Robt. Simpson Special for the Champion Herd was also won by Mr. Beaty, who had both the winning Senior and winning Junior Herds.

Featherstone Bros. of Oakville had the Reserve Junior Champion Bull, in Avonlea You'll Do King; the Senior and Grand Champion Female in Avonlea King's Iona Lass; and the Reserve Junior Champion in Avonlea King Iona Girl. They also scored in the winning top honors in the former class on their Get of Silver Spring April King, which won for them the T. Eaton Company Special, and in the Progeny Class with their Progeny of Avonlea You'll Iona, which also secured them the Grafton & Co. Special.

McClure Bros. of Georgetown, who were making their bid for top honors in this strong show, had the winning Junior Yearling Heifer, in Jester Royal Baroness.

The Boys' and Girls' Jersey and Guernsey Calf Club was also an interesting feature of this show, with Sam Harrop of Milton having the winning calf; Harold Jarvis 2nd; Clayton Dick 3rd; Tom Anderson 4th. In the Showmanship section, Beverly Ella was at the top; Tom Anderson 2nd; Sam Harrop 3rd; and Fraser McNabb 4th. The Nelson Robinson Specials to the Club Members of the three breeds were won as follows:- Holsteins David Pelletterio, who also won the W. S. Hall Special; Jersey, Sam Harrop; Guernsey, Clayton Dick.

Record Crowd Over 8000 Attend Milton Fair Saturday

Races and Other Features Make Good Attractions—Midway Jammed All Afternoon—Great Exhibit of Cattle and Poultry—92nd Annual Event Proves Among Most Successful

Delightful fall weather combined to make the attractions of the 92nd Annual Fair of Halton County Agricultural Society a great meeting place for over 8000 visitors on Saturday and the hub of the County and district for a showing of agricultural exhibits. It was the largest crowd in attendance in the past twenty years at least. The Directors had taken care that all departments gave visitors the general view they came to see.

While pre-war years have seen larger exhibits in the hall, the various departments had a good showing. The roots and vegetables made a fine display and the school children's work was one that was admired as was also the Girls' Garden Brigade exhibit. Outstanding showing in the hall was however, the exhibit of the various branches of the Women's Institutes of the County of Halton.
