

HUGHES CLEAVER

The Fourth 1944 report of the Special Committee on War Expenditures is of special interest to agriculture. War needs made it necessary for Canada to produce nitric acid and ammonium nitrate on a large scale and plants were established at Calgary and Niagara Falls. During the operation of these plants surpluses developed and on account of the scarcity of commercial fertilizer caused by the war, research work was done and a process was perfected for the production of commercial fertilizer for the use of Canadian argiculture and for export. The subcommittee making this inquiry has recommended that the title to both of these plants should be retained by the Government after the war and that they should be operated for the production of commercial fertilizer for Canadian agriculture.

The Conservative members on the committee voted against the report, but it was supported by all government members and members of the other opposition groups.
