slavia capital of Belgrade. The Germans were reported evacuating troops from Belgrade in transport planes.

Aachen Surrounded

By mid-week on the Western Front the Allies had virtually closed a pincers movement around Aachen with a deadly web of machine-gun fire, cutting the escape gap from the city to a corridor but a mile wide. Pierce fighting was continuing along the Leopold Canal where Canadian troops battled strong German units bent on stopping a new Canadian drive into the Schelde pocket, launched Monday morning.

East of Aachen six to 10 miles inside Germany, American 1st Army troops built up pressure along a 24-mile front and it appeared that a breakthrough into the Reich's industrial Rhineland was in the making there. Farther to the south, the American 3rd Army had straightened out a German bulge in the front between Metz and Nancy.

In Greece, British troops and Greek patriots liberated the historic city of Corinth, the gateway from the Peloponnese to northern Greece. Elsewhere in the Mediterranean, Allied land forces of the Adriatic launched an attack on Sarande, a little port in southern Albania, and an important supply base for the Nazi garrison on the Island of Corfu a few miles from the Albanian shore.

Churchill in Moscow

Fresh from the Quebec conference, Prime Minister Churchill showed up in Moscow during the week-end for talks with Premier Stalin. It was indicated the new Moscow conference may last a week and although there was no official word on the subjects of discussion, press dispatches said organization of the final blows against Germany and a multitude of political questions would probably come up. Expected to rank high in these discussions was the dispute between the Polish government in London and the Soviet-sponsored Polish Committee of Liberation.

Even while Mr. Churchill and Stalin met, Russian troops reached the Baltic Sea south of Memel, cutting the last overland communication between Germany and an estimated 150,000 Germans in Latvia and Lithuania. In Hungary Red Army troops thrust into the outskirts of the Hungarian military training centre of Drebreccen and were within 50 miles of Budapest.

On the home front, Prime Minister King said at Ottawa that the Canadian government welcomed the proposals set forth at Dumbarton Oaks for a world peace organization. The Dumbarton Oaks document, issued simultaneously in London, Washington, Moscow and Chungking, was a preliminary and incomplete plan for converting the United Nations into a powerful world peace organization.

The Berlin radio seemed even more concerned though, about the Russian front and admitted in a broadcast that the Red Armies have surrounded the German East Prussian port of Memel after driving up to the Baltic both above and below the city. The Nazis also said two new Soviet offensives have been launched north of Warsaw and admitted that their forces in Lithuania had evacuated the stronghold of Aaurage.

By Wednesday it appeared that the Russian autumn offensive was indeed in full swing.
