four beaches on the shores of Lingayen Gulf and found only slight Japanese opposition. Soon American tank-led spearheads were pushing across the flatlands of the Philippine Island to the key city of Manila, less than 120 miles away.

The operation was under the direction of Gen. MacArthur and he waded ashore with one of the assault waves and established his headquarters on the Island, which holds the memories of Corrigidor and Bataan for him.

Observers see in this latest Pacific move, a strategy aimed at obtaining air and naval bases which will command the vital Japanese sea lanes to Malaya and the Dutch Indies and to obtain a new jumping off place for the next step against the Japanese.

The Sunday School Lesson

SUNDAY, JANUARY 14th, 1945

JESUS FACES HIS LIFEWORK
 Golden Text.—Thou shalt worship the Lord thy God, and him only shalt thou serve. Matt. 4: 10.
 Lesson Text.—Matt. 3: 13-4: 11.
 Time.—A. D. 27. Place.—The Wilderness of Judea.

Exposition.—I. Jesus' Baptism, 13-17.
 Jesus Himself, the Baptizer "with the Holy Spirit and fire," comes to John to be baptized with water. Could anything make more plain the great importance of water baptism? Jesus was baptized with water to "fulfill all righteousness." God commands water baptism as the form by which sinful man shall publicly confess his renunciation of sin. Jesus was not a sinner, but He took the sinner's place, was made sin for us (Rom. 8: 3; 2 Cor. 5: 21) at Jordan ("the water") and Calvary ("the blood"). (Comp. 1 John 5: 6, R. V.) The two occasions on which God bore testimony to the Sonship of Jesus was here, when He humbled Himself to take the sinner's place in baptism, and when on the Mount of Transfiguration He humbled Himself by turning His back on the glory that was then becoming His, to come back and take the sinner's place on the cross (cf. Luke 9: 31, 35; Phil. 2: 6-8, 9). That God thus spoke is settled by competent testimony and is conclusive proof of the divinity of Jesus. Jesus was baptized not only with water but with the Holy Ghost (cf. Jno. 1: 33, 34).

II. The First Temptation, 1-4.
 The moment of loftiest exaltation and clearest testimony is immediately succeeded by Satan's fiercest assault, the baptism with the Holy Spirit by the repeated temptations. The temptation was just as necessary a preparation for Jesus' work as was the baptism with the Holy Spirit (Heb. 2: 17, 18; 4: 15, 16). Note that Jesus' temptation was by "the devil," i. e., it came from without, not from within, and it came from a person and not merely from abstract sin. The personality of the devil is clearly taught here. It also teaches us his cunning, malignity and defeat. The reality and completeness of Jesus' human nature are plainly seen. He met temptation as a man, and conquered it by means that are at our disposal: the Word of God and the power of the Holy Spirit.

The temptation covered the entire forty days (Luke 4: 1, 2). The three temptations here recorded are the climax of all, and are typical. Jesus met temptations in such a state of physical weakness as would make resistance to temptation most diffi-

cult and failure "most excusable"; but He did not fail, and so now no man can plead adverse circumstances as a justification for wrong-doing. Satan appealed to Jesus through the medium of an appetite the gratification of which would be perfectly right if it could be gratified by right means and methods. The devil introduced this temptation as he did that of Eve in the garden, by suggesting a doubt of God's Word. For Jesus to have done what Satan challenged Him to do would have been (1) to have doubted God's Word and to have sought confirmation of it by a token (viz. His ability to perform a miracle). (2) to have taken Himself out from under those human conditions and limitations under which He had voluntarily placed Himself for our redemption (Phil. 2: 6-8; Heb. 2: 14).

It would have involved the throwing up of His entire mission, viz., the redemption of man by a Divine Person Who had become real man. Essentially the same sin to which Satan tempted our Lord is committed by men to-day when they take themselves out of the sphere of sacrifice and of suffering in which it is necessary that one live if he is to have saving power with his fellow men. (3) It would have been to have distrusted God. Jesus would rely upon God to supply His needs in lawful ways. Jesus met this and the two other temptations with the "sword of the Spirit, which is the Word of God" (Eph. 6: 17).

III. The Second Temptation, 6, 7.
 In the second temptation, the devil himself quoted Scripture; but, as usual, he misquoted it. He left out an important clause (see Ps. 91: 11, 12). For Jesus to have accepted the devil's challenge would have been, (1) to have exhibited doubt of God's Word by making an experiment to see if it would come out as God had said; that is tempting God; (2) an act of spiritual pride, a mere display of trust in God with no other end to accomplish by it.

IV. The Third Temptation, 8-11.
 In the last temptation the devil comes out in his true colors: he seeks worship for himself. The devil would have the Son of God render to him that worship belonging to God alone. Was there any temptation in this for Christ? In a sense, yes. Not that He for a moment yielded or was even confused by it, but Satan offered Him the dominion of the world by another road than the Cross. Our Lord Jesus dreaded with agony the road that led through Gethsemane and over Calvary; but He never left that road and we must not (Matt. 16: 23, 24).
