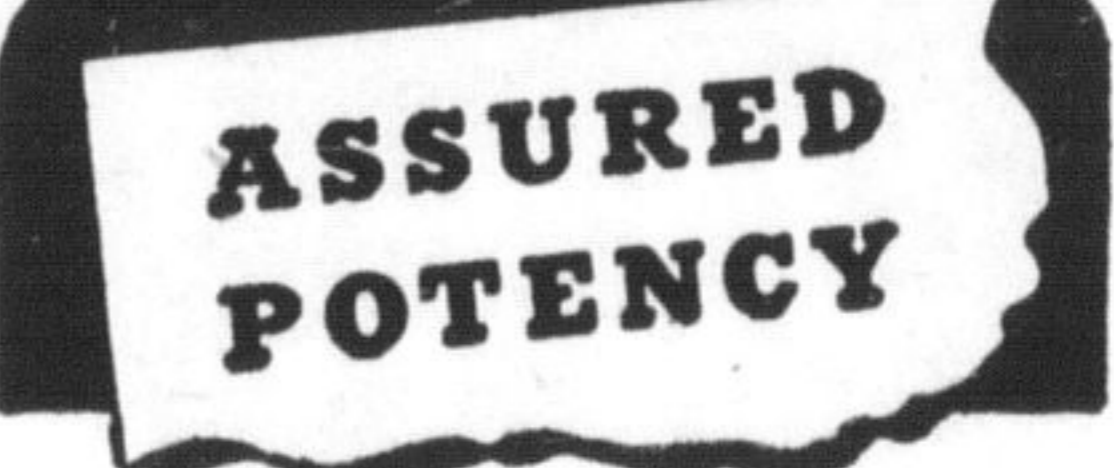
A RICH CATCH
