Obituary

ALEXANDER E. ELLIOTT The community was indeed shocked to learn of the sudden death in Hamilton General Hospital on Friday of Alexander E. Elliott. Mr. Elliott had gone to the hospital for treatment, but his condition was not considered serious and he had been about as usual before going to the hospital. He was seventy-five years of age. Alexander Elliott was born in Esqueving Township. In 1897 he went to Western Canada and settled at Maidstone, Sask. He farmed until 1919 and was a school teacher and a school inspector for years. In 1930 he came back east and made his home in Milton, travelling extensively in Canada and the United States. He will be greatly missed by a wide circle of friends in Milton and district. The funeral was held on Monday afternoon with service at the home of his nephew, Mr. George E. Elliott, in charge of Rev. J. Riddell, assisted by Rev. Mr. Shanon. Mr. Elliot was a member of Knox Presbyterian Church. Interment was made in Evergreen Cemetery. The pall bearers were Messrs. Wm. Hampshire, Chas. Day, Wilfred Crozier, John Mitchell, John Elliott and Robert Elliott.

GEORGETOWN

Miss Sybil Bennett was in Ottawa last Friday and Saturday attending the Dominion convention of the Progressive-Conservative Party. Georgetown's 1945 tax rate will be 35 mills, it was decided at the monthly Council meeting held in the Municipal Building on Monday evening. War brought sadness to another Georgetown home last week when Mr. and Mrs. Adam Kay received word that their eldest son, Pte. William Kay, died of wounds. Saturday was a big day at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Sam Tennant, John Street, when friends gathered to welcome Lieut. Russell Firrestone back to Georgetown. Council passed a motion at the last meeting allowing yearly salaries for municipal officials, the Mayor voting against this motion. These are set at \$125 for the Mayor, \$100 for Reeve, and \$80 for Councillors, with a \$5 penalty for each meeting missed. Dr. C. V. Williams, M. O. H. for Georgetown, presented his annual report to Council. He pointed out the necessity for sewerage and urged the Council to take the initial step of having a sanitary engineer make a survey and get the estimated cost of such service.—Herald.
