—Good Friday to-morrow.

—Special Easter services will be held in the churches on Sunday.

—School closes this afternoon for the ten-day Easter vacation.

—Temperatures of 75 to 80 in the shade have been recorded this week.

—The winter's accumulation of sand has now been cleared from the main business street.

—Mr. Bert Allan has secured a position as section foreman of the C.P.R. at Waterdown.

—Work has commenced on the Milton Brick Transport Company Truck Garage on Mill Street.

—This early spring has proven that it's the weather and not the time of year that brings on clean-up fever.

—An unusual winter has been followed by an unusual spring. March still has a few days left but the most of it has certainly given April and May weather, many days with temperatures well over the 70 mark.

—Word has been received of the promotion of George F. Nixon to the rank of Lieutenant Colonel of the 181st Q. M. Battalion of the American Army, somewhere in France. He is the son of Mr. J. Fred Nixon, Middletown, Conn., formerly of Ashgrove, Ontario.

—Owners of revolvers and pistols must re-register these firearms with the police between March 1st and July 1st. When re-registering the former registration card should be provided. Rifles and shotguns that have already been registered need not be re-registered.

—This March may be the warmest in Toronto's weather records of 104 years. The warmest March ever experienced by Torontonians was that of 1903, when the mean for the month was 39 degrees. "Up to date we are running along at 38, or 10 degrees above normal," said the weatherman.

INVASION VILLAGE COPIED FOR D-DAY

LONDON (CP)—Another of the countless preparations that preceded D-Day came to light with announcement that a full-size plaster French "village" in Yorkshire helped train the Normandy invaders. About two dozen soldiers erected it in three weeks and thousands of soldiers knew it as a training ground.

Wood and plaster road blocks prevented easy entrance to the village. An imitation cemetery had rows of "graves" decorated with German helmets. Plaster cows stood in the fields and modified "booby traps" lay about to catch the unwary. Hurried departure of the enemy was suggested by overturned chairs and tables in houses and restaurants.

A burned-out garage, its roof fallen in, stood near the main street. Swastikas were defaced. A street sign "Adolfstrasse" was crossed out and the words "Rue de Paris" chalked just above.

Two camouflage Corps officers who designed the village were chosen because they had lived for years in either northern or southern France. Only materials used in construction were cobblestones, wood, canvas, paint and fibrous plaster.

COPS HIT JACKPOT

SYDNEY, N.S. (CP)—Police hit the jackpot when they collared a youth who admitted to a series of thefts over the past year. Recovered were three guns, 19 flashlights, 12 coat hooks, 24 tea strainers, 54 packages of band-aid, an identification bracelet, a gross of pen nibs.

Weekly War Commentary

The Main River onto Germany's central plain.

Earlier the Germans said the Americans were hammering at the gates of Karlsruhe on the southern part of the front.

At the northern end of the front the American 9th and British 2nd Armies were driving through the ruined industrial acres of the Ruhr valley. Essen, greatest city of the valley, was outflanked by the Allied armies. Americans were in the suburbs of Duisberg and the entire valley faced a flanking threat by the British 2nd Army which had advanced 15 miles or more on the Westphalian plain.

In all, at least 100 miles of the east bank of the Rhine was secured by Allied troops by Tuesday morning and the Germans still showed no tendency to stand and fight.

Meanwhile, the Paris radio said Field Marshal von Rundstedt had been placed under arrest at the order of Nazi leaders. The former commander of the enemy's forces on the Western Front had been placed under the protection of Elite Guard officer Muehlmann. Muehlmann, called the hangman of generals, formerly had the late Generals Fritsch, Reichenau, and Kluge under his "care". All died under mysterious circumstances.

On the Eastern Front Soviet columns have pushed to within 31 miles of Austria. Red Army columns were developed 69 miles southeast of Vienna. To the north the Russians had taken about 21,000 prisoners along the beaches of East Prussia and had advanced to within a mile of the former free port of Danzig.

In the Far East, a Japanese communique said a contingent of American troops had landed on the Kerama Islands in the Ryukyu group half way between Formosa and Japan. The communique did not claim the attack had been repulsed. An unconfirmed Tokyo bulletin claimed Allied landings on Cebu Island in the Philippines.

A new Superfortress attack on Kyushu in the enemy homeland was announced by the Americans in addition to continued plane attacks on Okinawa in the Ryukyus.

At mid-week American landings on Cebu Island were confirmed and the enemy continued to broadcast reports of Allied landings in the Ryukyus.

Back on the Western Front, the American 1st, 3rd and 7th Armies had joined forces in a solid front east of the Rhine. The 7th Army linked up with the 1st and the 3rd after making a clean breakaway from its Rhine bridgehead north of Worms crossing the Main River. The 7th Army was meeting practically no enemy opposition.

Paris radio said in an unconfirmed broadcast that American tank columns may be only 30 miles from Nuernberg. And the Free German Press Agency said Himmler had ordered the evacuation of the ancient German city, requisitioning vehicles to evacuate Nazi Party archives to Hitler's Berchtesgaden hideout.

WINNIPEG (CP)—Few draft evaders are in the vast areas along the Alaskan highway and in Alaska itself. Selective Service said in a report issued here. The report was based on findings of an industrial mobilization survey committee.
