## Halton School Pupils Visit the County Council

and mistakes can be very profitable too. I can only add that if I shall have been an inspiration for anyone to follow in my footsteps I shall feel myself well repaid."

Mr. Norman Craig then voiced a hearty vote of thanks to the ladies of the Mountain Union Institute for the splendid luncheon they had provided and also to the entertainers who had added so much to the enjoyment of the day.

Following the luncheon the students were divided into four groups and taken on a tour of inspection of the goal—or as much of it as could be seen from the outside—the meals, work, and exercise given the prisoners were explained to them by the Governor, Mr. Calvin Fleming. Miss M. B. Field, Registrar of Deeds, undertook the difficult task of explaining to the youngsters the why and wherefore of her office, showing them illustrations of how property deeds were tabulated and filed, explaining that every deed was registered with a stamp even to the hour and minute of its receipt.

Returning to the council chamber the students were present while routine business was underway. Also during the afternoon they were addressed by Judge Munro and Crown Attorney W. I. Dick, both of whom explained how the various courts of the county were operated and for what purpose. Mr. Dick also gave a detailed description—with illustrations of the system of finger-printing.

Some of the regular business of the day was as follows: A somewhat heated discussion took place when the road committee recommended that the road running through Stewarttown be paved. The following motion carried by one vote: Moved by C. Hillmer and G. Cleave, that the Seventh Line and part of No. 17 sideroad connecting Stewarttown and Georgetown be paved.

Moved by W. Robertson and J. M. McDonald that ten prizes ranging from \$10 down to \$1 be given for the best essays submitted by any pupil attending to-day under the title "Our Visit to the County Council." Essays to be not more than 300 words and to be sent to the County Clerk not later than May 15.—Carried.

A by-law was passed appointing Ralph Young and Company as County Auditors.

Insurance was renewed with the General Accident Insurance Company for the amount of \$414.23.

A final decision was reached with regard to the overseas booklet to advertise Halton County, when it was moved by C. Hillmer and G. Cleave, that the tender for printing 5000 booklets from Davis-Lesson be accepted at \$975; the tender of the engravers for plates at \$430, sales tax extra in both cases, and also the price of the Ferris advertising for \$160 be accepted. Also that the color of the cover be green and the design plain as per sample submitted and that extra copies outside of these may be sold to the province of Ontario at cost.

A letter from Paul A. Fisher, representing the Federation of Agriculture, and with regard to the Rural Health Service, asked that the County Council appoint a representative to address a public meeting on April 25 to explain just how far the County Council has gone in its health service plans. It is expected that this meeting will also be addressed by the Provincial Minister of Health.

Mr. J. M. McDonald was appointed to represent the council.

It was moved by Mr. Biggar, seconded by Wm. Robertson, that C. V. Hillmer and N. Gilbert be the representatives of the Halton County Council of the Children's Aid Society for 1945.—Carried.
