Sapper Ross Maxwell Had Five Years in Army When Wounded May 8th

Word came to Mr. and Mrs. Norman Maxwell, Milton, on Saturday, that their son Sapper Ross Maxwell has been wounded while serving in Germany and the wounds were sustained on May 8th, the day hostilities ceased. He was with the Royal Canadian Engineers.

Saper Maxwell had been in the army for five years and had spent four in overseas service. He went through Normandy, France and Belgium to Germany safely only to susare described as shrapnel in the right serving in Germany. foot and leg.
