Council Discusses Plan for Collection of Garbage Here

Plans for Heating Town Hall and Building By-law are given Consideration at Meeting of Council on Tuesday Evening—Arena found to be in need of Repairs and Date for Return is asked

The regular meeting of Milton Council was held on Tuesday evening. Councillors S. A. Fay, J. W. Higgins, G. C. Gowland, J. A. Rush, R. H. Ptolemy, C. G. Riddell, Reeve C. H. Heslop were present with Mayor Geo. H. Dawson, presiding.

A letter from Chief of Police F. McNiven was read in regard to several matters pertaining to police work.

A letter from George Elliott asked Council to appoint a Councillor to look after the town's interest at the adjourned tax sale.

Mr. E. Harrop gave a list of the suppliers of milk to him for his dairy, but no report had been received from the other dairy delivering milk to the town.

The Finance Committee passed the above accounts and others totalling \$845.01 for payment.

Chief McNiven was present to discuss certain matters with the Council in connection with dogs running at large, two riding on bicycles, riding on sidewalks with bicycles, etc.

Town Solicitor Elliott gave a report of the progress being made with the Sheriff in regard to eviction orders.

A check was to be made out to Mr. Whewell for the right of way into the proposed sewerage disposal plant site.

The proposed building by-law was studied and some points discussed. This by-law is not yet complete but being drafted. It must be passed by the Municipal Board before final sanction by the Council.

A by-law was read twice dealing with the erection and operation of a chicken-killing plant in Milton. This by-law has to have the approval of the Municipal Board and read a third time by council before becoming law.

J. W. Higgins was by motion authorized to act on behalf of the Town to bid on a lot to be sold at the adjourned sale of taxes.

The dairies are to be notified by the proper authorities that suppliers of milk will have to have milk houses before milk can be delivered to those selling in Milton. It was agreed that the provisions of the by-law must be enforced.

Council authorized the clerk and solicitor to advertise for creditors in connection with the D. Somers estate and to pay these accounts as the sums of money now on hand permits.

Chief McNiven notified Council that he would be attending the Assessing Officers' Convention in Niagara Falls next week. \$25.00 was granted on expenses to this convention.

Mr. Cecil Wood of the High School staff requested permission to hold a tag day for the milk for Britain Fund in the near future. As another tag day is to be held on the day selected an alternate date suggested was June 23rd.

A grant of \$25.00 was made to the Lorne Scots Band for the assistance given and attending V-E Day celebrations in Milton.

A sample of scroll to be presented to returning service men was submitted to Council. This was left for attention at the next meeting.

Chairman Ptolemy of the Town Hall Committee presented plans for a heating system for the Town Hall. These plans called for forced draft hot air heating and covered the whole building.

This matter was discussed at some length as the present system must be replaced before winter. It was decided to have a heating engineer advise the council at the next meeting.

Council adjourned at 12.25 a.m. to meet at 7.30 p.m. on Tuesday, June 19th.

The Mayor was appointed to attend the Convention of the Canadian Federation of Mayors in Toronto on June 18th to 21st.

Mayor Dawson presented booklets to Councillors showing the National Housing Act as supplied by the Dominion Government. Council felt that the citizens of Milton should be made conversant with this plan and ordered that an advertisement be inserted in explanation. A number of booklets

TORONTO (CP)—Premier George Drew's Progressive Conservative government was returned to power in Ontario with at least 66 seats in an election which slashed the government's combined opposition from 52 to a possible 23 members.

Leaders of the C.C.F. and Liberal parties in the province, E. B. Jolliffe and Mitchell F. Hepburn, respectively were defeated in their own ridings while Premier Drew returned to the premiership victorious in Toronto High Park where he had faced a straight fight against Lewish Duncon, C.C.F. candidate.

On the basis of the civilian vote, the Progressive Conservative party dealt the C.C.F. its most severe defeat and rose from its two-year role as an outnumbered government to assume that of an administration with a strong majority in the legislature. The election returned the Liberal party, minus its former leader, to its 1929-34 role of official opposition.

The active service vote will not be known for approximately a week, but it was expected that the results would do no more than possibly change individual results.

Liberal and C. C. F. candidates were successful in 10 and six seats respectively compared with representations of 15 and 34 in the last legislation. Two Liberal-Labor and two Labor-Progressive members completed the line-up of the government's opposition on Tuesday when the results of polling in Wellington North, Kenora, Rainy River and Sault Ste. Marie remained inconclusive.

Ontario citizens voted in record numbers and incomplete Canadian Press compilations indicated that the record total vote of 1,571,431 polled in 1937 would be exceeded by a large margin.

"This is really a double victory," declared Premier Drew. "Naturally I'm happier than I can say to have won in my own riding of Toronto High Park, but I am perhaps even more pleased to have this convincing proof that our people in this province are not easily misled."

Mitchell Hepburn announced his retirement from politics following the setback to his party and his personal defeat in Elgin. "The people have spoken and I accept their verdict," he said. "So far as I am personally concerned, it is my first defeat in 19 years, and I don't mind it at all."

C.C.F. Leader Jolliffe said: "Election or no election, in season and out of season, the C.C.F. will continue to struggle to win more freedom and security for the people."

Premier Drew announced Tuesday he has filed a writ seeking \$100,000 damages for libel against The Toronto Star and Joseph E. Atkinson, its publisher.

Two libel suits against the premier are planned or already have been filed.

Flt. Lieut. E. E. Wismer, defeated C.C.F. candidate in Toronto Riverdale, announced he was taking court action for libel and slander against Premier Drew and the Globe and Mail Publishing Company. His statement described as untrue the Premier's "statements to the effect that I was neither on the Intelligence staff of the R.C.A.F. at any time nor on any operational flight at any time anywhere."

Last Saturday, Andrew Brewin, C.C.F. lawyer candidate in the federal riding of Toronto St. Paul's, said Provincial Constable J. A. Rowe had instructed him to take action against Premier Drew for libel and slander. The statement followed a radio speech by the premier in connection with charges by Mr. Jolliffe that Mr. Drew maintained a paid political police force.

In the afternoon an executive meeting was held at Bronte United Church. Important plans were made for the coming year. The past president Mr. Stanley Turner, of Trafalgar, thanked Rev. D. A. Facey for his fine leadership in the Young People's work during the past five years. The closing devotions were conducted by Mr. Henry Cripps, of Milton.

Halton County followed the general trend in Ontario on Monday in returning to office the Drew government and again sent Mr. Stanley Hall to be their representative at Queen's Park with an increased majority. Voting on Monday was heavy in all sections. In the 1943 elections 11,398 votes were polled in the county and on Monday 14,544 votes were cast.

Halton in another respect followed the general trend and gave less support to Cecil Millward the C. C. F. candidate than was given the nominee of that party in 1943. Mr. Millward polled a total vote of 2,555 this year in comparison with 3,304 secured by John Wilkinson in 1943. This year the C. C. F. candidate did not poll nearly half the vote of the successful candidate.
