**TO THE ELECTORS OF HALTTON:**  
As promised, I will deal this week with the Liberal policy respecting social security.

We believe that in a country as wealthy as Canada social security measures should be in operation which will assure a fair standard of living to everyone under all circumstances. The fear which arises as a result of unemployment, illness and old age, will all be met by adequate legislation.

**Unemployment Insurance:** This act is now in force and has already accumulated a reserve of over 200 million dollars. The act is patterned after the British act and is purely an insurance measure. I would hope that eventually the act would be extended to include the savings feature as well, so that those who pay unemployment insurance would be assured of getting back part of their payments, even though they are never unemployed. Under the present act no one participates excepting the unemployed.

**Family Allowances:** No employer of labor pays any worker a dollar more because he is a married man with a family to support. In the past, wealthy people have been permitted to deduct \$105 yearly from income tax payments with respect to each child and the married man in the lower income tax brackets has received no benefits whatever. Under the Family Allowances measure, which is now in force, it provides that, commencing July, 1945, monthly cheques will be issued to the parents of all children in Canada of 15 years of age and under. The amounts vary from \$5 to \$8 per month, depending on the age of the child. Every parent will receive the cheques, but the provision has been made to prevent duplication benefits and the amount of the Family Allowance cheques is deducted from the income tax deductions. The Conservative Party has criticized this act and if the Conservative Party is elected to office, there is grave danger that the act will be repealed. This measure is the most forward looking social security measure that has been passed during my ten years of office. In effect, it is a transfer of wealth by taxation to the tune of 200 million dollars yearly from the pockets of those who do not need the money to the pockets of those who need it very badly. When the act was passed, I advocated on the floor of the House that the Family Allowance payments should be taken out of the excess profits of industry, but no steps have been taken in that regard.

**Old Age Pensions:** In the last speech from the throne, the government forecasted an amendment to this act, but time did not permit the introduction of the amendment. In my opinion, the means test should be eliminated, the age limit reduced, especially in respect to people who are unable to work, and a new part should be incorporated in the act in regard to voluntary savings. The government policy has not yet been announced in regard to the new act, but the above indicates where I stand.

**TAXATION FOR PROSPERITY**

"The Government, by the conscious and deliberate exercise of its functions, can influence to a vital degree the conditions of (Canadian) life. . . . The important thing is that it should direct that influence toward the creation of a stable and prosperous community."

To this great end Progressive Conservative taxation policies are designed. We believe the power to tax must be creative, not destructive. It must help, not hinder; stimulate, not depress. Wisely and deliberately it must be used as one of many Government controls to prevent both artificial booms and economic depressions. Above all, the Progressive Conservative Party is determined that taxation shall be used beneficially as an instrument of expanding prosperity.

Taxation must be used to bridle the strong and help the weak. It must encourage and not discourage all legitimate enterprise. . . . Every useful activity which gives employment at fair wages and contributes to the sum total of Canadian prosperity must be encouraged to develop its fullest potentialities.

We will see that the power to tax is returned to Parliament, rather than left in the hands of officials, so that the taxes borne by the people are those imposed by their elected representatives. To that end we will remove the present abuses of income tax administration by ensuring that:

- ✓ Assessments must be made promptly and accurately.
- ✓ Assessments must be final, so far as the government is concerned, except in cases of fraud.
- ✓ There must be an end to penalties and interest charges due to departmental delays.
- ✓ There must be an end to arbitrary assessments, based on the discretionary rulings of officials.
- ✓ There must be an end to the discretionary powers of officials.
- ✓ There must be a simplified procedure for appeals on assessments by every taxpayer.

We shall see that personal tax exemptions are raised to at least \$1,200 for married persons and \$750 for single persons, that each taxpayer shall be allowed, in addition, a personal tax exemption of \$400 for each dependent, and that the rates of personal income tax in the lower tax brackets are substantially reduced.

This soundly practical Taxation Policy, we of the Progressive Conservative Party pledge to all Canadians as a forthright aid to revitalized, co-operative prosperity for all.
