SAFE MILK FOR SUMMER COTTAGES

In out-of-the-way districts where commercially pasteurized milk is not available, summer cottagers and other temporary residents are advised, as a health measure, to make the milk safe by home pasteurization. It is a simple operation, and the only utensils necessary are a double-boiler, preferably of aluminum, and a floating dairy thermometer. The latter may be purchased at most hardware stores or dairy supply houses.

The procedure, as recommended by the Division of Dairy Research, Dominion Department of Agriculture, is as follows—half fill the lower part of the double boiler with water, and put the milk in the upper half. A boiler of 2 1/2 quarts capacity will be required to pasteurize two quarts of milk. Place the thermometer in the milk and the double boiler on the stove. Examine the thermometer from time to time until it registers a temperature of 140 degrees F. Then turn down the heat slightly because the water will be hot enough to bring the temperature of the milk up to the desired 150 degrees.

The temperature of 150 degrees should be maintained for 30 minutes. Then the milk should be immediately covered up and cooled to 50 degrees or below. In cold weather this can be done by setting the vessel containing the milk in cold water, but in summer time a mixture of ice and water is necessary. Place the cooled milk in a refrigerator or in a cool cellar or cooling pit. The milk should be used within 24 hours for infant feeding and within 48 hours for adults. Milk to be pasteurized should be fresh, and it is important that care should be taken to clean the utensils thoroughly.

NEW WHALING SHIPS

LONDON — Wireless installations, hospital, dispensary and fresh water plans are part of the equipment of the first of the new British whaling factory ships. The ship, the "Southern Venture" is constructed according to the extraction and production of liver the latest ideas, including a plant for oil and the dehydration of whale meat. The wireless installation enables constant communication with the whale catchers, and there is also apparatus for direct communication with Britain. The equipment is so complete—even to the extent of a hospital and dispenser—that the vessel is able to remain at sea for very long periods. A constant supply of fresh water is provided by a plant with a capacity of 750 tons a day.
