TEXAN PERFECTING NEW GAS PROCESS

AUSTIN, Texas, (CP)—Dr. E. P. Schoch of the University of Texas, reporting on years of experiments with natural gas, says he now believes Texas has the key to a great industrial development in its natural gas.

Under a process he developed, Dr. Schoch says, it should be commercially profitable by this fall to basic to the manufacture of plastics—acetylene.

Acetylene can be produced from natural gas at half the cost of extracting it from carbide, says Dr. Schoch. In his method the gas is subjected to treatment by high-voltage electricity.

The process, he says, also promises to increase the efficiency of carbon black production and the production of ethylene, a chemical comparable to acetylene used in plastic and alcohol production.

"We ought to be able to get nine pounds of carbon black per 1,000 cubic feet of natural gas," Dr. Schoch says, "instead of the present production of a pound and a half."

He predicts that full use of the acetylene process should bring Texas industry \$80,000,000 annually when war restrictions now holding up its commercial application are removed.

(Continued from Page One) and Takamatsu on Shikoku Island—all industrial cities—were blazed in the raid.

Japanese resistance at Balikpapan, Borneo, petered out to occasional bursts of gunfire after the Australian invaders had cleared the last ridge before the city and were threatening the last enemy air base in the area. Aussies on the right flank of the attacking force had overrun an airstrip to give the Allies a base within striking distance of Java.

Tokyo radio announced without Allied confirmation that five U. S. warships shelled Karafuto Island Tuesday. The targets of the shelling were said to be military installations off Shikoku, a Japanese port near the Soviet-Japanese border on the island which, known to the Russians as Sakhalin Island, is partly owned by the Soviet Union.

Church Licensed Marriages Valid

Act of Parliament Legalizes More Than 200 Marriage in English Church

GRAVESEND, England (CP)—Between 200 and 250 brides who stood at the altar of St. Mary's Church here have found they are not legally married. A special act of parliament will be passed to legalize all ceremonies between Nov. 1, 1938, and March 1, last year.

It has just been discovered that the church was not licensed for marriage at that period.

Rev. R. M. Scantlebury, vicar of St. Mary's, has assured all the brides that "in the eyes of the law their weddings are perfectly legal and will not be affected by the discovery. The bill will be "for the purpose of removing doubt touching the validity" of the ceremonies, the home office said.

"St. Mary's is a very beautiful new church which was built just before the war to replace a tin-roofed mission hall" said Mr. Scantlebury. "When it was finished the excitement of having such a fine new church was so great that my predecessor quite forgot to do the obvious thing and get it licensed."

"When I became vicar I continued merrily to marry the couples in the church as it never even occurred to me that it was not licensed. When the mistake was discovered I immediately ceased to perform any more marriages until I had got in touch with the authorities and a license had been issued."

NEW SPARK PLUGS

Old Whalers Ensure Allies' Oil Supply

Skelton Fleet Operated During War off South African Coast

DURBAN, South Africa (CP)—It now has been revealed that for five years Durban's skelton whaling fleet, always subject to enemy attack, has ensured that supplies of essential oil have been available to the Allies. At the outbreak of war most of the whale catchers were taken over for conversion to mine sweepers and patrol vessels. Five of the oldest and least suitable were left to carry on whaling operations based on Durban. Apart from enemy dangers these whale catchers operated without lighthouse guidance, and under many other difficulties.

About 14,000 tons of whale oil were obtained from whales caught off the Natal coast. Almost all of this has been processed in the Union. About 8,000 tons of sperm oil brought in was shipped overseas. In addition nearly 12,000 tons of whale guano was dealt with at the Durban whale factories.

A Capetown firm is heading its post war program with an order to Britain for a 30,000-ton whale factory ship. It will be the biggest of its kind afloat. This will replace the firm's 18,000-ton Tafelberg, lost during the war.

Whale factory ships will have plenty of prey when the catchers follow the mother ships to the Ross Sea again. The great blue whales have had a good chance to breed during the war with Norwegian, South African and Japanese whalers otherwise engaged.

GOLD WORTH MILLIONS IN RAND DEEP LEVELS

JOHANNESBURG (CP)—An inquiry by experts into the possibility of mining gold at deep levels—that is, below 8,500 feet—is recommended by the committee on deep level mining in a report which has been presented to the South African parliament.

The tonnage of the ore locked up in the level areas of the central Witwatersrand, says the report, is enormous and in the 30 miles between Roodenport and the East Rand Proprietary Mines, it has a value of about £200,000,000 (\$900,000,000).

The report says: "The possible extension in depth of the central section of the Witwatersrand gold field, which is of the utmost importance to the country, is rivalled only by the possibilities of the new field beyond Vintnerspost and of the more recently discovered field in the Orange Free State. It is clear that nothing should be left undone which could in any way facilitate the exploitation of this deep level zone."

WET MINING

The report says that, with good ventilation, the present system of wet mining, possibly with some modification and with the aid of refrigeration, may be carried on to a depth of 10,000 feet, but that greater depths will require the adoption of dry mining.

The report accordingly recommends that exports should be asked to inquire into the feasibility of dry mining and into the question whether the expenditure of money on shaft sinking to greater depths would be justified.

The system of wet mining to which the committee refers in its report is the system of keeping everything wet underground in order to reduce the amount of dust in the air which is one of the great causes of phthisis. It has the disadvantage that the air below ground is completely saturated and humid air at the high temperature which are experienced at great depths has little cooling effect on the body. That is why the report suggests that mining at depths below 10,000 feet, where temperatures are very high, cannot be carried on with the use of water and that other methods of reducing dust will have to be found.

BRITAIN ANNOUNCES FARM TRAINING PLAN

LONDON (CP)—Aimed at placing 100,000 ex-service personnel in jobs on farms, Britain has announced a "back-to-the-land" training scheme which applies to all non-disabled men and women returned from the three forces and the merchant navy.

The program will supply a year's training on farms, including specialized farming, with selected committees instructing those who have no previous land experience. For those who successfully complete the year's practical training, courses in agricultural institutes will be made available.

Trainees will be accommodated on farms or in hostels nearby and will receive an unstated salary augmented by dependants' and travelling allowances.
